COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE - Substantial Changes

#### I. Summary:

CS/SB 152 creates the Veterans Employment Small Business Grant Program to encourage small businesses in Florida to hire veterans. The program is created within the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) and is to be administered by Florida Is For Veterans, Inc. (FIFV). Under the program, a small business in Florida that hires a veteran as an employee may receive a one-time grant of \$1,500 for each veteran hired, or \$3,000 for each disabled veteran hired by the small business. These awards may not exceed \$10,500 per fiscal year for a qualifying small business.

To qualify for a grant under the program, a small business must agree to:

- Employ a qualifying veteran for at least one year;
- Provide a report with information on the employment status of each qualifying veteran upon the request of FIFV;
- Pay each qualifying veteran an amount equal to at least 90 percent of the annual median income for veterans in Florida based on the most recent federal census or the most recent American Community Survey 5-year estimated published by the U.S. Census Bureau;
- Invest any awarded grant moneys into the small business to facilitate further job creation and employment of veterans; and
- Not rehire a veteran previously claimed as an employee in order to receive funds under the program.

FIFV is required to submit a report by December 31, 2020 to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on the grant program's progress and outcomes for the preceding three fiscal years.

Beginning July 1, 2017, and for the 2017-2018 through 2021-2022 fiscal years, the bill appropriates \$500,000 in nonrecurring funds from the State Economic Enhancement and Development Trust Fund to the DEO for transfer to FIFV to implement and administer the program. FIFV may award grant moneys up to a maximum of \$500,000 per fiscal year to small businesses and is authorized to expend no more than \$25,000 annually for staffing and administrative costs.

The bill takes effect on July 1, 2017.

#### II. Present Situation:

#### **Florida Veterans**

A veteran is defined as a person who served in the active military, naval, or air service and who was honorably discharged or released from active duty under honorable conditions.<sup>1</sup> In the United States there are nearly 21 million veterans, of which, over 1.5 million reside in Florida.<sup>2</sup> This makes Florida the state with the third largest veteran population, behind California and Texas.<sup>3</sup> The chart below shows veterans residing in Florida by age range. More than half of Florida's veterans are age 60 or older.

Florida also has the third largest population of disabled veterans in the nation with more than 291,000.<sup>5</sup> The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (USDVA) is the federal agency tasked with making the official determination of the existence of a service-connected disability. The term "disabled veteran" is defined as an individual who has served on active duty in the armed forces, has been separated under honorable conditions, and has established the present existence of a service-connected disability or is receiving compensation, disability retirement benefits, or a pension because of a public statute administered by the USDVA or a military department.<sup>6</sup>

The term "service-connected" is further defined in the U.S. Code to mean that the disability or death suffered by the veteran was incurred or aggravated in the line of duty in active military,

naval, or air service.<sup>7</sup> Veterans who have been determined by the USDVA to have a serviceconnected disability are eligible for monthly disability compensation. There are instances in which a veteran's service-connected disability is not determined by the USDVA. In this instance, the Department of Defense (DoD) would determine the existence of a disability and provide compensation to the veteran. The secretaries of the military departments have the authority to make the final determination of disability in each case.<sup>8</sup> When that determination is made the servicemember may decide whether to receive military retirement benefits from the DoD or disability compensation from the USDVA.

#### **Employment Assistance for Veterans in Florida**

The CareerSource Florida network connects employers with qualified, skilled talent and Floridians with employment and career development opportunities. The workforce network is comprised of CareerSource Florida, which is the statewide board charged with setting state workforce policy; the Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO), the state agency responsible for administrative and fiscal affairs and policy implementation; and 24 local workforce development boards, which oversee the local delivery of workforce services to businesses, job seekers, and workers at nearly 100 career centers statewide.

Each career center is equipped to help job seekers connect with businesses in their field, locate training opportunities, and teach skills such as resume writing and interview techniques. Within each career center are Disabled Veterans' Outreach Program (DVOP) specialists and Local Veterans' Employment Representatives (LVER). DVOP specialists focus on intensive case management services for veterans with barriers to employment, particularly disabled veterans.<sup>9</sup> LVERs build relationships with employers and engage in advocacy efforts with hiring executives and managers to increase employment opportunities for veterans.<sup>10</sup> They are also responsible for ensuring that veterans receive the full range of priority workforce services in the career centers.

Veterans may also utilize the Employ Florida Vets website, an online job search engine and portal administered by CareerSource Florida and the DEO and tailored to veterans.<sup>11</sup> Developed through a series of focus groups with Florida veterans, the Employ Florida Vets Portal translates a veteran's Military Occupational Specialty Code (a code that represents the employment classification for the specialty/job that the military veteran performed while on active duty) into an equivalent civilian job title.<sup>12</sup>

Florida's overall unemployment rate in December 2016 was 4.9 percent.<sup>13</sup> The unemployment rate among Florida veterans during the 2015 calendar year was 5.4 percent compared to 4.6 percent nationally.<sup>14</sup> The unemployment rate among Florida Post-9/11 era veterans during the 2015 calendar year averaged 6.7 percent compared to 5.8 percent for Post-9/11 era veterans nationally.<sup>15</sup>

#### Florida Is For Veterans, Inc.

During the 2014 Regular Session, the Legislature created Florida Is For Veterans, Inc. (FIFV), a non-profit corporation created within the FDVA.<sup>16</sup> The purpose of FIFV is to promote Florida as a veteran-friendly state, encourage retired and recently separated military personnel to keep or make Florida their permanent residence, help equip veterans for employment opportunities, and promote the hiring of veterans.<sup>17</sup> FIFV is governed by a nine-member board of directors in which the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives each appoint three members. In April 2015, the FIFV board of directors selected "Veterans Florida" as the organization's brand name.<sup>18</sup>

FIFV is responsible for administering the Veterans Employment and Training Services (VETS) program for the purpose of connecting veterans and employers.<sup>19</sup> Under the VETS program, FIFV administers a grant program for businesses to train veterans to meet a business's workforce-skill needs and operates a veteran-specific entrepreneur initiative program through a partnership with Florida's state universities.<sup>20</sup> Additionally, as part of the VETS program, FIFV is directed to provide one-on-one assistance to veterans seeking employment, which may include skills assessments, resume creation, identification of employment goals, and referrals to career centers. FIFV must also connect with employers in the state to educate them on the value of a veteran's military experience in the workplace.

#### **Employment Initiatives for Small Businesses in Florida**

There do not appear to be any state incentive programs that are targeted to encourage small businesses to hire additional employees or that specifically encourage small businesses to hire veterans. Most of the current state programs are geared towards providing financial and technical assistance to help small businesses grow, which may result in those businesses hiring additional

employees.<sup>21</sup> Enterprise Florida, Inc., assists small businesses through its Division of Minority & Small Business, Entrepreneurship, and Capital, including export assistance. Small businesses are also eligible for Florida's economic development incentive programs.<sup>22</sup>

The Florida Small Business Development Center (SBDC) Network is another resource available to small business owners seeking assistance. The SBDC is designated as the principal business assistance organization for small businesses in the state, and links the state's education system with community outreach to aid in the development and education of the state's entrepreneurs and small business community.<sup>23</sup> The network provides entrepreneurs and small business owners with one-on-one business development consulting; entrepreneurial, business, and management development training; and business information and research.<sup>24</sup>

### III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill creates s. 295.231, F.S., to establish the Veterans Employment Small Business Grant Program (program). The program is created within the Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) and is to be administered by Florida Is For Veterans, Inc. (FIFV). This program is an incentive based program created to stimulate investment in the state's economy by providing grants to small businesses that hire honorably discharged veterans and veterans with a service-connected disability.

The bill defines a "small business" as an independently owned and operated, for-profit, privately held business that employs fewer than 50 persons; generates \$1 million or less in annual revenue; and has maintained its principal place of business in this state for at least the previous four calendar years.

A qualifying small business may receive up to \$10,500 per fiscal year for hiring honorably discharged veterans and veterans with a service-connected disability hired on or after July 1, 2017. A qualifying small business that hires a veteran as an employee may be eligible to receive a one-time grant of:

- \$1,500 for each honorably discharged veteran;<sup>25</sup> and
- \$3,000 for each veteran with a service-connected disability.<sup>26</sup>

In order to qualify for grant funding, a small business must enter into an agreement with FIFV that requires the small business to:

• Employ a qualifying veteran for at least one year in order to become eligible for grant funding;

- Provide a report with information on the employment status of each qualifying veteran upon the request of FIFV;
- Pay each qualifying veteran an amount equal to at least 90 percent of the annual median income for veterans in Florida based on the most recent federal census or the most recent American Community Survey 5-year estimated published by the U.S. Census Bureau;<sup>27</sup>
- Invest any awarded grant moneys into the small business to facilitate further job creation and employment of veterans;<sup>28</sup> and
- Not rehire a veteran previously claimed as an employee for purposes of receiving an additional grant.

FIFV must notify the appropriate regional small business development center of a small business's participation in the grant program in order to facilitate improved access to the resources of the Florida Small Business Development Center Network.

The bill authorizes the DEO to develop rules to implement the program including specifying requirements for the application and approval process and the documentation necessary to claim grant funds.

By December 31, 2020, FIFV must provide a report to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on the grant program's progress and outcomes for the preceding three fiscal years. The report must include:

- Aggregate information on the total number of veterans and small businesses assisted by the program;
- An accounting of how the corporation used the state funds it received for the grant program;
- A description of the nature of the participation in the program by the Florida Small Business Development Center Network;
- The number of small businesses receiving grant funds;
- The number of veterans employed by each small business receiving grant funds;
- The salary paid to each veteran employed;
- The period of time for which the small business employed each veteran;
- The grant program's economic benefit to the state; and
- All performance-based metrics and methodologies used to calculate the grant program's economic benefit to the state.

Beginning July 1, 2017, and for the 2017-2018 through 2021-2022 fiscal years, the bill appropriates \$500,000 in nonrecurring funds from the State Economic Enhancement and Development Trust Fund to the DEO for transfer to FIFV to implement and administer the program. FIFV may award grant moneys up to a maximum of \$500,000 per fiscal year to small businesses and is authorized to expend no more than \$25,000 annually for staffing and administrative costs.

The Veterans Employment Small Business Grant Program takes effect on July 1, 2017 and terminates on July 1, 2022. On July 1, 2022, FIFV must transfer any unexpended funds to the DEO for reversion to the State Economic Enhancement and Development Trust Fund.

B. Private Sector Impact:

Businesses that choose to participate in the program created in the bill may be eligible to receive up to \$10,500 per fiscal year for hiring honorably discharged veterans and veterans with service-connected disabilities. Small businesses may apply to receive:

- \$1,500 for hiring an honorably discharged veteran; and
- \$3,000 for each veteran with a service-connected disability.
- C. Government Sector Impact:

The bill appropriates \$500,000 in nonrecurring funds from the State Economic Enhancement and Development Trust Fund to the DEO for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 through Fiscal Year 2021-2022, for transfer to FIFV to implement and administer the program. FIFV may award grant moneys up to a maximum of \$500,000 per fiscal year to small businesses and FIFV is authorized to expend no more than \$25,000 annually for staffing and administrative costs.

The bill provides that the grant program terminates on July 1, 2022. On July 1, 2022, FIFV must transfer all remaining appropriated funds to the DEO for reversion to the State Economic Enhancement and Development Trust Fund.

A. Committee Substitute – Statement of Substantial Changes: (Summarizing differences between the Committee Substitute and the prior version of the bill.)

# CS by Military and Veterans Affairs, Space, and Domestic Security on March 14, 2017:

The CS:

- Establishes the grant program within the Department of Economic Opportunity rather than the Department of Veterans' Affairs;
- Narrows the definition of "small businesses" to those that employ 50 or fewer persons and generate \$1 million or less in annual revenue;
- Reduces the length of the grant program from 10 years to 5 years;
- Changes the grant program's funding source from the General Revenue Fund to the State Economic Enhancement and Development Trust Fund;
- Reduces the total grant amount a business can receive each fiscal year from \$25,000 to \$10,500;
- Reduces the grant amount awarded to a business for each veteran hired;
- Reduces the total appropriation for the lifetime of the grant program to \$2.5 million. (\$500,000 for five years);
- Reduces Florida Is For Veterans, Inc.'s cap on administrative costs from \$100,000 to \$25,000 per fiscal year to implement the program; and
- Requires Florida Is For Veterans, Inc., to submit a report to the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives by December 31, 2020, on the program's progress and outcomes.

#### I. Summary:

CS/SB 1202 establishes an annual, one-day sales tax holiday for veterans on November 11. During the holiday, clothing items under \$60 are exempt from the tax levied under ch. 212, F.S. A retailer may elect not to participate if less than five percent of the retailer's gross sales of tangible personal property in the prior calendar year is comprised of clothing items as defined by the bill.

The Revenue Estimating Conference estimates that the bill reduces General Revenue receipts by \$1.4 million in Fiscal Year 2017-2018, with a \$1.4 million recurring reduction. It reduces local revenue by \$0.3 million in Fiscal Year 2017-2018, with a \$0.3 million recurring reduction.

The bill takes effect on July 1, 2017.

#### II. Present Situation:

#### Florida Sales and Use Tax

Florida levies a six percent state sales and use tax on the sale or rental of most tangible personal property, admissions, rentals of transient accommodations, rental of commercial real estate, and a limited number of services.<sup>1</sup> In addition to the six percent state sales tax, Florida law authorizes

counties to levy discretionary sales surtaxes.<sup>2</sup> Sales tax is added to the price of taxable goods or services and the tax is collected from the purchaser at the time of sale.

Chapter 212, F.S., contains statutory provisions that authorize the levy and collection of Florida's sales and use tax, as well as the exemptions and credits applicable to certain items or uses under specified circumstances. There are currently more than 200 different exemptions, exclusions, deductions, and credits from sales and use tax.<sup>3</sup>

Since 1998, the Legislature has enacted 19 temporary periods (commonly called "sales tax holidays") during which certain household items, household appliances, clothing, footwear, books, and/or school supply items were exempted from the state sales tax and county discretionary sales surtaxes. The Florida Legislature has not previously authorized a sales tax holiday for veterans.

Opportunities for veterans to shop tax free currently exist at eight of Florida's 20 major military installations that have a military exchange on base.<sup>4</sup> Military exchanges sell consumer goods and services tax free. However, not all veterans have exchange privileges. Recently, the Department of Defense announced a policy change in January 2017 that will extend limited online military exchange shopping privileges to all honorably discharged veterans starting on November 11, 2017.<sup>5</sup>

#### **Proof of Veteran Status**

Florida has the third largest population of veterans in the nation after California and Texas with more than 1.5 million veterans.<sup>6</sup> Currently, there is no single veteran identification card that is available to all veterans and that can be used as proof of veteran status.

There are various forms of identification issued by the Federal government and the state of Florida that can be used as proof of veteran status. The most common types of identification include the following:

• **DD Form 2 (Retired), Uniformed Services ID**:<sup>7</sup> This card is issued by the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) to retired members of the U.S. Uniformed Services<sup>8</sup> entitled to retired

pay,<sup>9</sup> members on the Temporary Disability Retired List, and members on the Permanent Disability Retired List;<sup>10</sup>

- **DD Form 2 (Reserve Retired), Uniformed Services ID:** This card is issued by the DoD to retired members of the Reserves and the National Guard who are under the age of 60;<sup>11</sup>
- **DD Form 2765, Uniformed Services ID and Privilege Card:** This card is issued by the DoD to Medal of Honor recipients, 100-percent disabled veterans, former members in receipt of retired pay, and other limited benefits-eligible categories described in DoD policy;<sup>12</sup>
- **DD Form 214, Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty:** This form is issued by the DoD to each military servicemember upon separation from active duty service. The DD Form 214 contains the veteran's dates of service, last duty assignment, pay grade and rank, awards received, and characterization of service (i.e., honorable, general under honorable conditions, dishonorable, etc.).<sup>13</sup>
- Veteran Health Identification Card: This card is issued by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (USDVA) to veterans who are enrolled in the USDVA health care system for identification and check-in at USDVA appointments.<sup>14</sup>
- **100-percent Disabled Veterans State ID Card:** This card is issued by the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs to any Florida veteran who has a 100-percent total and permanent service-connected disability rating from the USDVA or the DoD;<sup>15</sup>
- Veteran Designation on Florida Driver License or ID Card: Florida veterans can receive a capital "V" printed on a driver license or ID card issued by the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles to indicate an individual's veteran status.<sup>16</sup>

## III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

The bill establishes an annual, one-day sales tax holiday on November 11 for veterans purchasing clothing items with a sales price of \$60 or less. The bill defines the term "veteran" to mean a person who served in the active military, naval, or air service who has been honorably discharged or released or who later received an upgraded honorable discharge or release.

Clothing eligible for the tax exempt holiday includes:

- Any article of wearing apparel intended to be worn on or about the human body, excluding watches, watchbands, jewelry, umbrellas, and handkerchiefs; and
- All footwear, excluding skis, swim fins, roller blades, and skates.

To be eligible for the sales tax holiday, a veteran must show proof of military status at the time of purchase by presenting one of the following forms of identification:

- DD Form 2, Uniformed Services Identification Card, issued by the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD);
- DD Form 2765, Uniformed Services Identification and Privilege Card, issued by the DoD;
- DD Form 214, displaying the term "Honorable," issued by the DoD;
- Veteran Health Identification Card, issued by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs;
- Veteran identification card, issued by the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs under s. 295.17, F.S.;
- A valid driver license or identification card with a "V" or the word "veteran" designation on it issued by the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV); or
- Any other proof of veteran status, issued by the DHSMV.

Retailers that make tax-exempt sales pursuant to the provisions of this bill must report to the Department of Revenue (DOR) the amount of its gross sales on the retailer's sales and use tax return.

The bill allows a retailer to opt out of the sales tax holiday if less than five percent of the retailer's gross sales of tangible personal property in the prior calendar year is comprised of clothing items, as defined by the bill. If the retailer chooses not to participate in the tax holiday, by August 1, annually, the retailer must notify the DOR in writing and post a copy of the notice in a conspicuous location at the place of business.

The DOR is authorized to adopt rules, including emergency rules, to implement the provisions of this bill.

The bill takes effect on July 1, 2017.

#### V. Fiscal Impact Statement:

The Revenue Estimating Conference estimates that the bill reduces General Revenue receipts by \$1.4 million in Fiscal Year 2017-18, with a \$1.4 million recurring reduction.<sup>17</sup> It reduces local revenue by \$0.3 million in Fiscal Year 2017-2018, with a \$0.3 million recurring reduction.<sup>18</sup>

B. Private Sector Impact:

Indeterminate, but positive. Individuals eligible for the sales tax holiday will see a reduction in the cost of purchasing clothing items.

C. Government Sector Impact:

The Department of Revenue (DOR) estimates the cost associated with notifying businesses of the sales tax exemption, by printing and mailing a Tax Information Publication (TIP), will be approximately \$133,128.<sup>19</sup>

Beginning September 2018, and each year thereafter, the DOR will mail a TIP to businesses as a reminder of the sales tax holiday at an estimated cost of \$121,398.<sup>20</sup> The cost to send the TIP in subsequent years may need to be adjusted to include potential increases in the postage and vendor print rates.<sup>21</sup>

Retired Army Lieutenant Colonel Glenn Sutphin was appointed Executive Director of the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs by Gov. Rick Scott and the Cabinet Aug. 2, 2016. In addition, he is a recipient of the Order of Saint Barbara from the U.S. Field Artillery Association and the Bronze Order of Mercury from the Signal Corps Regimental Association.
