I. Summary:

SB 174 expands the eligibility for residency at a veterans' home to include a spouse or surviving spouse of a qualifying veteran, or a parent of a child who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces.

The bill revises priority order for admission to a veterans' home. The bill ranks in 5th place for admission a spouse or surviving spouse of a veteran and in 6th (last) place a parent of a child who died while in military service. These rankings preserve as a higher priority admission of a veteran over a nonveteran.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2024.

II. Present Situation:

Law on Veterans Homes

Cost and Funding of Resident Care

A resident of a state veterans' home must contribute to the cost of his or her care if the resident receives a pension, compensation, gratuity from the federal government, or income from any other source if the monthly amount exceeds \$160.¹

The average cost of care at a state veterans' nursing home in Florida is \$394.15 a day.² The cost of care is funded through multiple sources, including from the resident. Cost charged to residents

ranges from an average \$98.63 a day for a resident on limited income, to the average cost of \$358.93 a day for a self-paying resident.³ If a resident veteran is between 70 and 100 percent disabled, the resident pays nothing.⁴

In addition to the resident's portion of payment, a federal subsidy in the form of reimbursement supplements the cost of care. Federal reimbursement is based on a per diem rate established by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Administration.⁵ Current VA per diem for basic care is set at \$129.97 a day, while per diem for disabled veterans who are determined to be at least 70 percent disabled is set at \$474.45 per diem.⁶ To qualify for reimbursement, federal law requires a facility to maintain a population of at least 75 percent veterans.⁷ If facility construction or renovation is funded solely by the state, then the facility is only required to maintain a population of at least 50 percent veterans.⁸

Federal law authorizes a state veterans' home to house non-veteran residents who are spouses of veterans or parents whose children died while in military service.⁹ These residents are required to pay the full cost.

Eligibility for Admission

To be considered for admission to a veterans' home in Florida, a veteran must have been discharged from the military with either an honorable or an upgrade to an honorable discharge.¹⁰

The state provides for veterans' homes as both Veterans' Domiciliary Homes¹¹ and Veterans' Nursing Homes.¹² Both veterans of wartime service and of peacetime service are eligible for admission. The order of admission to a veterans' home is ranked by priority.

Domiciliary Homes

Domiciliary care means shelter, sustenance, and incidental medical care for a person who is ambulatory and can otherwise provide self-care, but not a person in need of hospitalization or nursing home care services.¹³ A domiciliary home is an assisted living facility.

To be eligible for admission, a veteran must:

- Be a resident of the state at the time of application;
- Not be mentally ill, habitually inebriated, or addicted to drugs;

- Not owe money to the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs (FDVA) for services rendered during a previous stay at a FDVA facility;
- Have applied for all financial assistance reasonably available through governmental sources; and
- Have been approved as eligible for care and treatment by the VA.¹⁴

Residents are admitted in order of priority as follows:

- A veteran with wartime service who has a service-connected disability.
- A veteran with wartime service who has a non-service-connected disability.
- A veteran with wartime service and no disability.
- A veteran with peacetime service.¹⁵

An applicant must file with the administrator all necessary information for admission purposes, including a certificate of eligibility and a certified copy of discharge.¹⁶

Nursing Homes

In addition to assisted-living facilities, Florida law provides for veterans' nursing homes.¹⁷ Each nursing home is overseen by an administrator who is selected by the Executive Director (director) of the FDVA.¹⁸

To be eligible for admission a veteran must:

- Be in need of nursing care;
- Be a resident of the state at the time of application;
- Not owe money to the FDVA for services rendered during a previous stay at a FDVA facility;
- Have applied for all financial assistance reasonably available through governmental sources; and
- Have been approved as eligible for care and treatment by the VA.¹⁹

Residents are admitted in the following order of priority for an eligible veteran:

- Who is a resident of the state.
- Who has a service-connected disability as determined by the VA, or who was discharged or released from service for a disability incurred or aggravated in the line of duty and the disability is the condition for the nursing home need.
- Who has a non-service-connected disability and is unable to defray the cost of nursing home care.²⁰

Veterans Facilities in Florida

Currently, 9 state veterans' homes operate in the state, 8 skilled nursing facilities and one assisted living facility. Nursing homes are located in Daytona Beach (Emory L. Bennett State Veterans' Nursing Home), Orlando (Alwyn C. Cashe State Veterans' Nursing Home), Land O'Lakes (Baldomero Lopez State Veterans' Nursing Home), Pembroke Pines (Alexander "Sandy" Nininger Veterans' Nursing Home), Panama City (Clifford C. Sims State Veterans' Nursing Home), Port Charlotte (Douglas T. Jacobson State Veterans' Nursing Home), Port St. Lucie (Ardie R. Copas State Veterans' Nursing Home) and St. Augustine (Clyde E. Lassen State Veterans' Nursing Home), Florida. The assisted living facility is in Lake City (Robert H. Jenkins, Jr. Veterans' Domiciliary Home), and to be admitted, veterans must be able to eat and dress. Two new homes are in the works, which will be located in Collier and Marion counties.²¹

As of October 2023, the occupancy rate for fully operational state veterans' nursing homes is at 94 percent.²² Only the Alwyn C. Cashe facility is not fully operational.²³ The FDVA is in the process of appealing a decision by the VA that the home does not pass certification, and correcting deficiencies identified by the Agency for Health Care Administration.²⁴ As such, the home currently has 23 private-pay, non-veteran residents.²⁵

Currently, 11 people statewide are on the waiting list for residential admission.²⁶ Veterans who are at least 70 percent disabled advance to the top of the list.²⁷

III. Effect of Proposed Changes:

SB 174 expands the eligibility for residency at a veterans' home to include a:

- Spouse of a qualifying veteran;
- Surviving spouse of a qualifying veteran; and
- Parent of a child who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces.

The bill revises the definition of "applicant" to mean the spouse or surviving spouse of a qualifying veteran, or a parent of a child who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces.

The bill revises the definition of "resident" to mean an eligible applicant to a state veterans' home.

The bill revises priority order for admission to a veterans' home. The bill ranks in 5th place the admission of a spouse or surviving spouse of a veteran and in 6th (last) place a parent of a child

who died while serving in the Armed Forces of the United States. These rankings preserve as a higher priority admission of a veteran over a nonveteran.

A fiscal impact is not expected since a qualifying nonveteran resident will be charged the full cost of care and housing.

POLICY ANALYSIS

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This bill revises eligibility regarding admission to the Florida State Veterans' Nursing Home System, Domiciliary Home System and long term care facilities. SB 174 revises Chapter 296 of Florida Statute to allow admission of spouses, surviving spouses, or parents of children who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces into the Veterans Nursing Homes of the State of Florida as is permitted in federal law pursuant to CFR 51.210. Changes definitions of numerous terms taken into consideration during the admissions process and in result broadens the applicant and admittee pool. Veterans still take priority over spouses and Gold Star Parents, due to priority of admissions.

2. SUBSTANTIVE BILL ANALYSIS

1. PRESENT SITUATION:

Currently, Florida Law only allows for veterans to be admitted into the State Veteran Nursing Home system. Upon admission to a nursing home, Veterans would have to be separated from their spouses, given they are married, as Florida Statute currently reads, and Gold Star Parents are not admissible.

2. EFFECT OF THE BILL:

Revision of this language in Chapter 296 of Florida Statute allows for Veterans' and their spouses to remain together if they chose to enter long term care. Pursuant to CFR 51.70(m) married couples also reserve the right to share a room with his or her spouse. In addition, it also allows Gold Star Parents to be admitted if they chose to enter a long-term care facility operated by the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs. Direct effect results in increased admissions due to a broader applicant pool.

	SB 174 expands SVNH and SVDH admission eligibility to the spouse or surviving spouse of a veteran, or the parents of a child who died while serving in the Armed Forces of the United States.
	The proposed changes raise potential legal issues with respect to funding from the United States Department of Veterans Affairs. First is the potential loss of per diem funding for each bed occupied by a non-veteran, as provided in 38 USCS § 1741 <i>Criteria for payment to State Homes</i> , and 38 CFR 51.50 <i>Eligible veterans — nursing home care</i> .
	The second legal issue concerning Federal funding involves the provisions for recapture or "clawback" of certain funds either utilized in the construction of State Homes ¹ or in hiring and retention of nurses. ²
	However, such legal concerns may be moot as the proposed legislation leaves intact admission eligibility requirements in Florida Statute § 296.36(1)(e), providing that a resident has been approved as eligible for care and treatment by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.

Successes, Engagements and Activities for Week Ending November 4, 2023

• State Veterans' Homes Program

The State Veterans' Nursing Home s (SVNHs) resident daily occupancy rate is 94% for our fully operational SVNHs, as of November 1, 2023.

Homes update:

- We continue to fill vacant beds in our State Veteran Nursing Homes. This week's census is at 94% and is the highest census since COVID.
- Alwyn C. Cashe SVNH was inspected for VA certification by the VA and for Medicare/Medicaid certification and relicensure by AHCA in August. It failed to pass the VA certification and the AHCA certification surveys. It did pass the AHCA licensure survey. We have requested a review by the VA decision and have corrected deficiencies cited by AHCA and have requested approval of our corrections. It currently has a census of 23 private pay residents, as of November 1, 2023.

• Veterans' Benefits and Assistance

- Mark Johnson, Veterans' Claims Examiner (VCE) Supervisor, VA Outpatient Clinic (VAOPC), Middleburg, successfully advocated a disability claim appeal, for multiple conditions, for a U.S. Navy Gulf War Veteran. Mr. Johnson met with the Veteran in July 2014, reviewed his file and discovered a denied claim for anxiety/depression, lower back and knees, and cervical spine disabilities. He discussed the issues with the Veteran, gathered evidence and filed an appeal to the Board of Veteran Appeals (BVA). After adjudication, the BVA granted several disabilities for an overall 100% Permanent & Total (P&T) rating, effective February 9, 2014. Due to Mr. Johnsons' advocacy, the Veteran now receives a monthly monetary compensation of \$3,750 and a \$130,470 retroactive payment was secured.
- Latasha Brown, VCE, VA Medical Center (VAMC), West Palm Beach, successfully advocated an initial disability claim for a Gulf War Era Veteran. Mrs. Brown met with the Veteran, reviewed his service treatment records, gathered evidence and filed a claim for multiple conditions. After processing, the VA granted several disabilities for an overall 40% rating. Due to Mrs. Brown's advocacy, the Veteran was awarded a monthly monetary compensation of \$731 and a retroactive payment of \$21,146 was secured.
- Armida Flores-Morales, VCE, VAMC, Lake Nona, successfully advocated a disability claim increase, for a Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), for a U.S. Marine Corps Veteran. Mrs. Flores-Morales met with the Veteran, reviewed his service treatment records, gathered evidence and filed the claim. After processing, the VA granted TBI with an overall 50% rating. Due to Mrs. Flores-



Morales's advocacy, the Veteran's monthly monetary compensation increased from \$328 to \$1,143 and a retroactive award of \$8,618 was secured.

- Roy Ward, VCE, VAMC, Lake Nona, successfully advocated a disability claim for a U.S. Army Veteran. Mr. Ward met with the Veteran in February 2023, reviewed his file and discovered worsening disability conditions. He discussed the issues with the Veteran, gathered evidence and filed the claim. After processing, the VA granted several disability increases with a 90% overall rating. Due to Mr. Ward's advocacy, the Veteran now receives a monthly monetary compensation in the amount of \$2,172 and a \$6,517 retroactive payment was secured.
- Kahdejha Parker, VCE, VAMC, Tampa, successfully advocated a disability claim, for a temporary 100% rating for surgery of the left foot, for a Veteran. Mrs. Parker was contacted by the Veteran's VA social worker on August 23, 2023, about the in-patient status of the Veteran following surgery. She gathered evidence of the convalescence period and filed a claim. After processing, the VA granted a temporary 100% rating for the disability recovery period. Due to Mrs. Parker's advocacy, the Veteran was granted a retroactive payment of \$3,456.
- Angela Brown, VCE, VAMC, Tampa, successfully advocated a disability claim, for Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC), for the widow of a Veteran. Ms. Brown met with the widow, reviewed the Veterans file and discovered that at the time of death, the Veteran had a 100% overall rating before he passed away. She discussed the issues with the widow, gathered evidence and filed the claim. After processing, the VA granted DIC.. Due to Ms. Brown's advocacy the widow now receives a monthly compensation of \$1,5624 and a retroactive award of \$4,256 was secured.

• Executive Direction and Support Services

- On November 2, 2023, Deputy Executive Director, Bob Asztalos, attended the Stand Down event in Miami-Dade County, hosted by District 10 Commissioner and Vice Chairman, Anthony Rodriguez, to provide resources of the Agency's benefits and services to veterans and their families.
- On November 3, 2023, Deputy Executive Director, Bob Asztalos, virtually participated in the Florida Health Care Association's (FHCA) Workforce Committee Meeting to discuss updates on FHCA workforce initiatives, and recovery relief assistance available to Floridians and VA benefit access services with available programs offered to servicemembers, veterans and their eligible families.
- On November 3, 2023, Deputy Executive Director, Bob Asztalos, participated in the Florida Healthcare Association (FHCA) Legislative Committee meeting, to discuss legislative issues to make recommendations to the FHCA Board.
- On November 3, 2023, Deputy Executive Director, Bob Asztalos, attended the Florida A&M Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps Unit 248th Anniversary Birthday Celebration, hosted by the United States Marine Corps and United States Navy, in Tallahassee.



Executive Director Outreach and Activities

- On October 31, 2023, Executive Director, Maj Gen (Retired) James Hartsell, participated in a conference call with Brandt McCartney, Founder and Chief Vulnerability Officer, to discuss Mission 38, which seeks to eliminate suicide through challenging stigma associated with bridging the gaps between suicide prevention, outreach and accessible benefits and services offered to veterans and their families.
- On November 2, 2023, Executive Director, Maj Gen (Retired) James Hartsell, Deputy Executive Director, Bob Asztalos, and Chief of Staff, Col. (Retired) Al Carter, participated in a monthly military conference call meeting with Enterprise Florida, Incorporated and the Military and Defense (EFI M&D) Programs, Disabled Veterans of America (DVA), Department of Military Affairs (DMA), Space Florida and Veterans Florida to network, synchronize efforts and collaborate with veteran organizations and stakeholders. The meeting focused on enhancing the overall health and well-being and safety of Florida's residents, servicemembers and veterans and their family members by connecting them with earned benefits.

Continuing Issues

FDVA implemented its discretionary pay plan to address challenges associated with recruiting and retaining administrative and clinical support staff for our State Veterans' Nursing Homes due to a state-wide shortage.

FDVA is working with DMS on the memorandum which details the implementation of the new "Administrative Health Insurance Assessment". The Agency is requesting an exemption, exception, or reduction in the amount assessed for each employee due to the nationwide nursing shortage.

FDVA is working on the Hope Florida Program within the Agency, geared to support the issues germane to Veterans, Service Members, and their families. We anticipate doing an opening of the program within the Agency before the end of November 2023.

Overview of FDEM Core Programs

Preparedness

- Administer Florida's All-Hazards planning programs to ensure the State Emergency Response Team (SERT) is prepared.
- Facilitate prompt and efficient response and recovery.
- Protect lives and property impacted by disasters.
- Coordinate training courses for counties and first responders.

Response

- Monitor incidents that may require State response.
- Manage 24/7 State Watch Office.
- Oversee logistics vendor management and resource deployment.
- Support State Emergency Response Commission through Tech Hazards Unit– *Nuclear Power Plants.*

Recovery

- Work to maximize and accelerate federal disaster assistance to eligible public-sector partners and residents.
- Administer recovery funding such as Public Assistance, Individual Assistance, and American Recovery Plan Act.
- Paid out over \$8.3 billion in recovery funding to local governments in four years.

Mitigation

- State Coordinating Agency of the National Flood Insurance Program.
- Administer FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program.
- Administer FEMA's Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities Program.
- Provide technical assistance to counties developing and implementing local mitigation strategies.

Hurricane Idalia – August 30, 2023

Immediate: RESPONSE

- Logistics FDEM mobilized requested resources to support residents and first responders in the path of the storm, including meals ready to eat, bottled water, tarps, and generators.
- Infrastructure 90% of utility accounts impacted by the storm were restored within three days of landfall.
- Human Services More than 220,000 meals, over 150,000 water bottles and 3,000 tarps have been distributed at Points of Distribution.
- Coordinate, Collaborate, Communicate Partner agencies & non-profits played integral roles in the Idalia response and ongoing recovery.









Hurricane Idalia – August 30, 2023

Ongoing: RECOVERY

- Public Assistance FDEM prioritized recovery funding and already has \$273M obligated.
- State Non-Congregate Sheltering Program Florida's state-led sheltering program is available through FloridaRecovers.org in partnership with the American Red Cross to provide temporary sheltering options such as travel trailers and hotel rooms for households whose homes may be uninhabitable.
- Volunteer Village Mayo, Lafayette County. Provides lodging for approximately 100 volunteers who are serving in the surrounding areas.
- Hazard Mitigation Grant Program The state is currently estimating that it will receive \$241,007,130 in hazard mitigation funding to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures in communities impacted by Hurricane Idalia.





Hurricane Ian – September 28, 2022

Ongoing: RECOVERY & MITIGATION

- Unite Florida Recovery Portal This program was created in the aftermath of Hurricane Ian to connect survivors to important recovery resources, including housing support:
 - State Non-Congregate Sheltering Program
 - Sheltering in Home for Recovery Continuation
- Public Assistance FDEM prioritized recovery funding by cutting through red tape and achieving federal obligation of \$1 billion in funds during the first 256 days post-landfall of Hurricane lan - 344 days faster than any other hurricane on record.
- Current Numbers: Obligated \$1.8B
 In Development \$2.48B, including \$88M for FDEM
- Hazard Mitigation Grant Program The state is currently estimated to receive \$1,165,933,863 in Hazard mitigation funding to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures in communities impacted by Hurricane Ian.

Ongoing: RECOVERY & MITIGATION

- Public Assistance
 - Obligated: **\$27,456,639**
 - In Development: **\$180,610,628**
- Hazard Mitigation Grant Program
 - The state is currently estimated to receive \$47,589,863 in hazard mitigation funding to implement long-term hazard mitigation measures in communities impacted by Hurricane Nicole.
