January 28th, 2026

February 4th, 2026

CS/CS/SB 96: Veterans Dental Care Grant Program passed favorably in Senate Committee Appropriations in Health and Humans Services.

CS/CS/SB 96 updates Florida's Veterans Dental Care Grant Program so eligible veterans with incomes up to 400 percent of the federal poverty level can receive oral health care. Expanding access to essential dental services for those who reside in Florida.



February 2nd, 2026

Both CS/SB 36: Use of Professional Nursing Titles and CS/SB 864: Public Records/Uterine Fibroid Research Database passed favorably in Senate Committee on Health Policy.

CS/SB 36 lets licensed nurses with doctoral degrees use appropriate doctoral titles and abbreviations. Requiring that anyone using the title "doctor" in a clinical setting clearly identify their nursing profession to avoid confusing patients.



CS/SB 864 is a public records measure that protects personal and medical information contained in the Uterine Fibroid Research Database. This will keep information confidential and exempt from public disclosure.

February 3rd, 2026

CS/SB 1196: Waste Facilities passed favorably in the Senate Committee on Environment and Natural Resources. This prohibits local governments from permitting new ash producing incinerators or waste to energy facilities within two miles of large, congressionally authorized water storage and restoration areas.

The bill preserves existing facilities and provides an exemption for counties with populations under 1.7 million.



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
