HIGHLIGHTS

Any week that starts in downtown Quincy with Sheriff Morris Young and George Clinton (of funk band Parliament fame!) is bound to be exciting. Many thanks to those who came together to honor Sheriff Young for his years of service to Gadsden County – what a way to celebrate! I also was able to get to Wakulla County for an official tour of the parks of St. Marks, and a great meeting with the Wakulla Elections staff in Crawfordville.















BUDGET

Back in Tallahassee, the pace of committee meetings slowed down a bit -but not the pace of visits by constituents, advocacy groups, and
organizations. We are deep in the budget process, as both chambers have
passed their respective budgets and are positioned for conference, where
we will begin to hammer out the differences between the Senate and House
budgets.

The Senate budget addresses many of my top priorities includinghistoric investments in pre-K, increased support for public education, affordable housing, protection of our land and water, and a number of key provisions impacting small rural counties. Several appropriations of note to Senate District 3 include funding for Rish Park in Gulf County and Apalachicola Oyster restoration, additional support for the Jefferson County School District as it returns to local control, and a special fund for small county law enforcement officers. There are still some issues to work out including funding for small county roads and bridges, and pay increases for State Attorneys and Public Defenders, but the best news is that both the House and Senate acknowledge the hard work of our state workforce by addressing pay increases for state employees.

HIGHLIGHTS

I had the chance this week to meet with Faith in Florida, a nondenominational group who is committed to finding ways to stop gun violence. I spoke with a local solar company that is providing skilled tech jobs in District 3, a company manufacturing digital license plates that can pay your parking meters and tolls for you and might be available in Florida soon, and folks involved in the freight rail industry about how intermodal solutions can contribute to economic development efforts across the District.




SPEAKING ENGAGEMENTS
