As week four of the 2024 Legislative Session comes to a close, I am excited to share some highlights from the Florida Capitol!

This Tuesday, Faith in Florida hosted their 2024 Faith in Florida Day at the Capitol! During their visit, Faith in Florida sat in on committee meetings, engaged with elected officials, and joined me for a press conference advocating for legislation they support, **SB 1446 - Access to Contraception**. As the Central Broward Organizer for Faith in Florida, I take great pride in being part of an organization where dedication to faith in action remains paramount.

I am also pleased to share that two of our bills passed through their committees! **SB**1688 - Career-Themed Courses and **SB** 350 - Cold Case Murders, passed unanimously through their respective committees, Commerce and Tourism and Criminal Justice. SB 1688 requires school districts to inform middle school students and parents of career and technical education opportunities. SB 350 allows local agencies to work on cold cases if they have the resources or turn them over to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement if they can't work the case. This accomplishment marks a milestone in efforts to address the concerns and priorities regarding the residents of Florida.

As the 2024 Session ensues, I'll continue sharing weekly updates straight to your inbox, with valuable information on our progress and highlighting critical developments in the legislative process.

I am grateful for the opportunity to represent you, and I am confident that, together

Committee Highlights

This week, <u>SB 1688 - Career-Themed Courses</u> and <u>SB 350 - Cold Case Murders</u>, passed unanimously through their respective committees, Commerce and Tourism and Criminal Justice!

<u>SB 1688 - Career-Themed Courses</u> mandates that school districts must notify middle school students and their parents about available career and technical education opportunities. Additionally, it obligates school districts to develop strategies for promoting and informing students about career and technical education programs. By mandating districts to inform students about career options and promoting technical education programs, the bill ensures a more informed student body. It focuses on making information accessible and allowing every student to explore diverse career possibilities.

<u>SB 350 - Cold Case Murders</u> allows local agencies to work on cold cases if they have the resources or turn them over to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement if they can't work the case. While this may not generate an end to the loss suffered by families, it does create the possibility of new leads and may lead to an arrest.

Committee Assignments

In the Florida Legislature, committees are established to vote on and propose solutions for the benefit of Florida's residents. These committees are tailored to specific issues and are named based on their intended purpose.

I am pleased to share that I have been appointed to several significant committees within the Florida Legislature, including the roles of Vice Chair on the Community Affairs Committee and membership in the Appropriations Committee on Agriculture, Environment, and General Government, Education Pre-K -12, Fiscal Policy, Health Policy, Regulated Industries, Rules, and the Joint Administrative Procedures Committee. I am excited about the opportunity to contribute and make a positive impact in these important areas, and I eagerly look forward to the meaningful work ahead. Committee Assignments for the 2024 Legislative Session

Updated on January 12, 2023

Community Affairs (Vice Chair): This committee is responsible for a broad CA range of issues relating to local governments. Appropriations on Agriculture, Environment, and General Government: This **AEG** committee is responsible for reviewing and making recommendations on the state budget for agriculture, environment, and general government programs Education Pre-K - 12: This committee is responsible for overseeing the ED state's education policies and programs for children from pre-k to 12th grade Fiscal Policy: This committee is responsible for reviewing and analyzing FP Florida's fiscal policies and making recommendations to the Senate. Health Policy: This committee is responsible for reviewing and proposing HP legislation related to health care policy in Florida. Regulated Industries: This committee is responsible for maintaining a review RI of the work of state agencies concerned with their subject areas and the performance of the functions of government within each area Rules: This committee is responsible for reviewing all proposed bills to RC ensure that they follow the guidelines of the State. Joint Administrative Procedures: This committee is responsible for ensuring **JAPC** that the rules adopted by the executive branch agencies do not create new law, and stay within the authority specifically delegated by the legislature.

Legislative Updates

After putting in months of groundwork, I've been actively working with my colleagues in the Senate and House to represent your interests. From advocating for enhanced healthcare services to pushing for comprehensive education reforms, our focus is on

driving meaningful change and addressing the core concerns that matter most to our community. Please see below for updated information on all of the bills I have filed for the 2024 legislative Session.

Legislation Update: Current List of Filed Bills



Updated on February 1, 2024

SB62	Resident Status for Tuition: This bill changes the requirements for a person to be considered a resident for tuition purposes to include time spent in certain correctional institutions.
SB64	Landlords & Tenants: This bill limits rent increases in certain circumstances and clarifies that a landlord can still terminate the rental agreement even if a partial payment is made.
SB252	Psychiatric Therapy: This bill defines electroconvulsive treatment (ECT) and psychosurgical procedure requiring only physicians perform them and prohibits procedures on minors.
SB350	Cold Case Murders: This bill allows local agencies to work on cold cases if they have the resources or turn them over to the Florida Dept. of Law Enforcement if they can't work the case. This bill has passed in Criminal Justice and is now in on Appropriations on Criminal and Civil Justice.
SB354	Task Force on Missing & Murdered African-American Women: This bill establishes the Task Force within the Florida Dept. of Law Enforcement to address and reduce violence against African-American women and girls.
SB372	State Certified Doulas: This bill defines a "state-certified doula" and requires the Dept. of Health to create certification requirements, best practices, a public registry, and a list of entities with approved education/training for doulas.
SB374	Human Trafficking: This bill revises the term "coercion" and authorizes the prosecution of specified offenses under the RICO Act. It requires several state agencies to establish awareness training programs and partnerships.
SB386	Affordable Housing Parking Requirements: The bill requires counties and municipalities to reduce parking requirements for certain developments if specific conditions are met. The concept of this bill is now in SB 328.
SB1426	Sale of Rabbits: This bill is designed to help curtail the growing wild rabbit population by requiring better accountability for rabbits sold by pet stores and prohibits the sale of rabbits during the months of March and April.
SB1446	Access to Contraception: This bill's primary purpose is to establish and protect the right to access contraception in the state of Florida.
SB1460	Child Support and Time-sharing Resulting from Unwanted Pregnancies: This bill sets the guidelines for pregnancies resulting from rape, incest or human trafficking if the victim is unable to receive an abortion.
SB1462	Reduction in Black Female and Women's Maternal Mortality Grant Program: This bill establishes the Reduction in Black Female and Women's Maternal Mortality Grant Program and aims reduce Black female and women's maternal mortality.
SB1610	Financial Accountability in Publicly Funded Education: This bill establishes universal standards for the use of public funds in the education system.
SB1688	Career-themed Courses: This bill requires school districts to inform middle school students and parents of career and technical education opportunities. This bill has passed in Commerce and Tourism and is now in Rules.
