Session Recap

Hello <<First Name>>,

As of June 16th, the Florida Legislature officially concluded the 2025 legislative session by passing the 2025-2026 budget. I am proud to announce that we secured over \$13 million dollars across 18 different projects that will benefit Central Floridians. These projects will improve our roadways, increases services for at-risk seniors, provide necessary support to our veterans and victims of human trafficking, and clean our vital water ways. Below is a deep dive into these 18 projects and an overview of the budget!

Community Projects Sponsored

Economic Development Projects

- <u>Cross Prairie Parkway Connector</u> -- \$6,000,000
 - This project will provide traffic relief and improved public safety by establishing an alternate north-south route for motorists in the City of St. Cloud and southern Osceola County.
- <u>Columbia Avenue Corridor Improvement Project</u> -- \$500,000
 - This project will expand and resurface improve 2.3 miles of busy roadway.
- St. Cloud Hopkins Park Community Center -- \$500,000
 - This project provides funds to promote better student performance and community safety.

Conservation Projects

- North Lake Toho Vegetation Reduction Project -- \$1,300,000
 - This project will treat approximately 100-acres of invasive vegetation on the lake, improving storm drainage.
- <u>Hubbs SeaWorld Research Institute Indian River Lagoon</u>
 Restorative Aquaculture Station Enhancements -- \$964,700
 - This project will enhance the restoration of critical habitats in the Indian River Lagoon.

Health and Human Services

- <u>City of Kissimmee Community Engagement Services Pilot</u> -- **\$200,000**
 - Funds from this project are dedicated to a Community Engagement Unit in the City of Kissimmee, designed to assist individuals encountered in difficult, high-risk situations.
- <u>The Transition House Homeless Veterans Program Osceola</u> -- **\$400,000**

- This project will provide substance use treatment services specifically dedicated to homeless Veterans who are not currently receiving VA benefits.
- <u>Central Florida Mobile Diaper Distribution Project</u> -- \$185,000
 - This project aims to ensure the health of infants and toddlers and stabilize family households' economic selfsufficiency through the consistent distribution of diapers and essential hygiene resources.
- <u>Lilly's Warrior Project for Pediatric Patients</u> -- \$50,000
 - These funds will support pediatric patients in Central Florida and nearby counties.
- <u>Came to Believe Recovery Addiction Recovery Pilot Program</u> -- **\$500,000**
 - This project will fund Came to Believe Recovery, which aims to conduct recovery retreats throughout Florida. This will support individuals in need of hope and a plan for an addiction-free future.
- Jack and Lee Rosen Jewish Community Center Senior Center
 -- \$600,000
 - This project will use these funds to provide a broad range of programs to support the physical, mental, and social wellbeing of seniors in our community.
- <u>Samaritan Village Transitional Safehouse Program for</u> <u>Survivors of Human Trafficking</u> - \$160,785
 - This project will expand mental health services, including the addition of a full-time licensed therapist with specialization in trafficking and complex trauma.

Storm Preparedness / Disaster Prevention

• <u>City of St. Cloud Stormwater Dam System</u> -- \$300,000

- The funds requested for this project are for the purchase and rapid deployment of a stormwater management dam during heavy rain events.
- North Kissimmee Stormwater Improvements -- \$500,000
 - This project aims to reduce flooding risks for residents that are located within the 100-year floodplain from displacement and storm damage.
- St. Cloud Fire Rescue Boat -- \$170,000
 - This project is for the purchase of an emergency response boat for the St. Cloud Fire Rescue Department.

Education

- Explicit Instruction for Emergent Bilingual Students Osceola
 County -- \$500,000
 - The purpose of this funding is to support emergent bilingual students in language acquisition.
- Junior Achievement of Central Florida Innovation Center Equipment -- \$400,015
 - This project will establish an Innovation Center in Lake Nona and offer the JA BizTown program to 30,000 5thgrade students enrolled annually in Orange County Public Schools.
- <u>University of Central Florida Center for the Study of Human</u> <u>Trafficking and Modern Slavery -- \$500,000</u>
 - This project will create an advanced, scalable, and effective AI-based monitoring tool for law enforcement to combat human trafficking activity by monitoring and analyzing buyers' on-line search behaviors.
