9	(1) This section may be cited as the "Casey DeSantis Cancer
10	Research Florida NCI Cancer Centers Act."
11 12	(2) The <u>Casey DeSantis Cancer Research</u> Florida Consortium of National Cancer Institute Centers Program is established to

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13 enhance the quality and competitiveness of cancer care in this state, further a statewide biomedical research strategy directly 14 responsive to the health needs of Florida's citizens, and 15 capitalize on the potential educational opportunities available 16 to its students. The department shall make payments to Florida-17 based cancer centers recognized by the National Cancer Institute 18 (NCI) at the National Institutes of Health as NCI-designated 19 cancer centers or NCI-designated comprehensive cancer centers, 20 and cancer centers working toward achieving NCI designation. The 21 department shall distribute funds to participating cancer 22 centers on a quarterly basis during each fiscal year for which 23 24 an appropriation is made.

(3) On or before September 15 of each year, the department 25 shall calculate an allocation fraction to be used for 26 distributing funds to participating cancer centers. On or before 27 the final business day of each quarter of the state fiscal year, 28 the department shall distribute to each participating cancer 29 center one-fourth of that cancer center's annual allocation 30 calculated under subsection (6). The allocation fraction for 31 each participating cancer center is based on the cancer center's 32 tier-designated weight under subsection (4) multiplied by each 33 of the following allocation factors: number of reportable cases, 34 peer-review costs, and biomedical education and training. As 35 used in this section, the term: 36

(a) "Biomedical education and training" means instruction
that is offered to a student who is enrolled in a biomedical
research program at an affiliated university as a medical
student or a student in a master's or doctoral degree program,
or who is a resident physician trainee or postdoctoral trainee

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in such program. An affiliated university biomedical research
program must be accredited or approved by a nationally
recognized agency and offered through an institution accredited
by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of
Colleges and Schools. Full-time equivalency for trainees shall
be prorated for training received in oncologic sciences and
oncologic medicine.

(b) "Cancer center" means a freestanding center, a center situated within an academic institution, or a formal researchbased consortium under centralized leadership that has achieved NCI designation or is prepared to achieve NCI designation by July 1, 2019.

(c) "Florida-based" means that a cancer center's actual or sought designated status is or would be recognized by the NCI as primarily located in Florida and not in another state.

(d) "Peer-review costs" means the total annual direct costs for peer-reviewed cancer-related research projects, consistent with reporting guidelines provided by the NCI, for the most recent annual reporting period available.

61 (e) "Reportable cases" means cases of cancer in which a 62 cancer center is involved in the diagnosis, evaluation of the 63 diagnosis, evaluation of the extent of cancer spread at the time of diagnosis, or administration of all or any part of the first 64 65 course of therapy for the most recent annual reporting period 66 available. Cases relating to patients enrolled in institutional 67 or investigator-initiated interventional clinical trials shall 68 be weighted at 1.2 relative to other cases weighted at 1.0. 69 Determination of institutional or investigator-initiated 70 interventional clinical trials must be consistent with reporting

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71 guidelines provided by the NCI.

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(4) Tier designations and corresponding weights within the <u>Casey DeSantis Cancer Research</u> Florida Consortium of National Cancer Institute Centers Program are as follows:

(a) Tier 1: Florida-based NCI-designated comprehensive cancer centers, which shall be weighted at 1.5.

(b) Tier 2: Florida-based NCI-designated cancer centers, which shall be weighted at 1.25.

(c) Tier 3: Florida-based cancer centers seeking
designation as either a NCI-designated cancer center or NCIdesignated comprehensive cancer center, which shall be weighted
at 1.0.

1. A cancer center shall meet the following minimum
criteria to be considered eligible for Tier 3 designation in any
given fiscal year:

a. Conducting cancer-related basic scientific research and
cancer-related population scientific research;

b. Offering and providing the full range of diagnostic and
treatment services on site, as determined by the Commission on
Cancer of the American College of Surgeons;

91 c. Hosting or conducting cancer-related interventional 92 clinical trials that are registered with the NCI's Clinical 93 Trials Reporting Program;

d. Offering degree-granting programs or affiliating with
universities through degree-granting programs accredited or
approved by a nationally recognized agency and offered through
the center or through the center in conjunction with another
institution accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the
Southern Association of Colleges and Schools;

100 e. Providing training to clinical trainees, medical 101 trainees accredited by the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education or the American Osteopathic Association, and 102 103 postdoctoral fellows recently awarded a doctorate degree; and 104 f. Having more than \$5 million in annual direct costs 105 associated with their total NCI peer-reviewed grant funding. 106 2. The General Appropriations Act or accompanying 107 legislation may limit the number of cancer centers which shall 108 receive Tier 3 designations or provide additional criteria for 109 such designation. 3. A cancer center's participation in Tier 3 may not extend 110 beyond June 30, 2024. 111 112 4. A cancer center that qualifies as a designated Tier 3 113 center under the criteria provided in subparagraph 1. by July 1, 114 2014, is authorized to pursue NCI designation as a cancer center or a comprehensive cancer center until June 30, 2024. 115 116 (5) The department shall use the following formula to 117 calculate a participating cancer center's allocation fraction: 118 119 $CAF = [0.4x(CRC \div TCRC)] + [0.3x(CPC \div TCPC)] + [0.3x(CBE \div TCBE)]$ 120 121 Where: 122 CAF=A cancer center's allocation fraction. 123 CRC=A cancer center's tier-weighted reportable cases. 124 TCRC=The total tier-weighted reportable cases for all 125 cancer centers. CPC=A cancer center's tier-weighted peer-review costs. 126 127 TCPC=The total tier-weighted peer-review costs for all 128 cancer centers.

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129 CBE=A cancer center's tier-weighted biomedical education 130 and training.

131 TCBE=The total tier-weighted biomedical education and132 training for all cancer centers.

(6) A cancer center's annual allocation shall be calculated 134 by multiplying the funds appropriated for the Casey DeSantis 135 Cancer Research Florida Consortium of National Cancer Institute 136 Centers Program in the General Appropriations Act by that cancer 137 center's allocation fraction. If the calculation results in an 138 annual allocation that is less than \$16 million, that cancer 139 center's annual allocation shall be increased to a sum equaling 140 \$16 million, with the additional funds being provided 141 proportionally from the annual allocations calculated for the 142 other participating cancer centers. 143

(7) Beginning July 1, 2017, and every 3 years thereafter, 144the department, in conjunction with participating cancer 145 centers, shall submit a report to the Cancer Control and 146 Research Advisory Council on specific metrics relating to cancer 147 mortality and external funding for cancer-related research in 148 the state. If a cancer center does not endorse this report or 149 produce an equivalent independent report, the cancer center 150 shall be suspended from the program for 1 year. The report must 151 152 include:

(a) An analysis of trending age-adjusted cancer mortality
rates in the state, which must include, at a minimum, overall
age-adjusted mortality rates for cancer statewide and ageadjusted mortality rates by age group, geographic region, and
type of cancer, which must include, at a minimum:

158 1. Lung cancer. 159 2. Pancreatic cancer. 160 3. Sarcoma. 161 4. Melanoma. 162 5. Leukemia and myelodysplastic syndromes. 163 6. Brain cancer. 164 (b) Identification of trends in overall federal funding, broken down by institutional source, for cancer-related research 165 166 in the state. 167 (c) A list and narrative description of collaborative 168 grants and interinstitutional collaboration among participating 169 cancer centers, a comparison of collaborative grants in 170 proportion to the grant totals for each cancer center, a 171 catalogue of retreats and progress seed grants using state 172 funds, and targets for collaboration in the future and reports 173 on progress regarding such targets where appropriate. 174 (8) This section is subject to annual appropriation by the 175 Legislature. 176 (9) The department may adopt rules to administer this 177 section. Section 2. Paragraph (a) of subsection (7) of section 178 179 20.435, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 180 20.435 Department of Health; trust funds.-The following trust funds shall be administered by the Department of Health: 181 182 (7) Biomedical Research Trust Fund. (a) Funds to be credited to the trust fund shall consist of 183 184 funds appropriated by the Legislature. Funds shall be used for the purposes of the James and Esther King Biomedical Research 185 186 Program, the Casey DeSantis Cancer Research Florida Consortium

of National Cancer Institute Centers Program, and the William G. 187 "Bill" Bankhead, Jr., and David Coley Cancer Research Program as 188 specified in ss. 215.5602, 288.955, 381.915, and 381.922. The 189 trust fund is exempt from the service charges imposed by s. 190 191 215.20. Section 3. Paragraph (c) of subsection (2) of section 192 210.20, Florida Statutes, is amended to read: 193 210.20 Employees and assistants; distribution of funds.-194 (2) As collections are received by the division from such 195 cigarette taxes, it shall pay the same into a trust fund in the 196 State Treasury designated "Cigarette Tax Collection Trust Fund" 197 which shall be paid and distributed as follows: 198 (c) Beginning July 1, 2017, and continuing through June 30, 199 2033, the division shall from month to month certify to the 200 Chief Financial Officer the amount derived from the cigarette 201 tax imposed by s. 210.02, less the service charges provided for 202 in s. 215.20 and less 0.9 percent of the amount derived from the 203 cigarette tax imposed by s. 210.02, which shall be deposited 204 into the Alcoholic Beverage and Tobacco Trust Fund, specifying 205 an amount equal to 1 percent of the net collections, not to 206 exceed \$3 million annually, and that amount shall be deposited 207 into the Biomedical Research Trust Fund in the Department of 208 Health. These funds are appropriated annually from the 209 Biomedical Research Trust Fund for the advancement of cures for 210 cancers afflicting pediatric populations through basic or 211 applied research, including, but not limited to, clinical trials 212 and nontoxic drug discovery. These funds are not included in the 213 calculation for the distribution of funds pursuant to s. 214 381.915; however, these funds shall be distributed to cancer 215

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216 centers participating in the <u>Casey DeSantis Cancer Research</u> 217 Florida Consortium of National Cancer Institute Centers Program 218 in the same proportion as is allocated to each cancer center in 219 accordance with s. 381.915 and are in addition to any funds 220 distributed pursuant to that section.
