- 1. Title of Project: Housing First for Persons with Mental Illness

- 4. Project/Program Description:

Rapid Rehousing (RRH), which is short- to medium-term rental assistance with support services, for severely mentally ill (SMI) homeless persons involved in the criminal justice system. Funding is used to provide up to two years (24 months) of rental assistance or serve as "bridge housing" for persons who are determined to need Permanent Supportive Housing based on length of time homeless and level of services needed. The goal is to quickly divert homeless persons with SMI, who have a history of arrest or frequent police interactions into supportive housing with wrap-around services. Referrals are made by the 11th Judicial Circuit Criminal Mental Health Project, area police departments, specialized homeless outreach teams and jail diversion behavioral health treatment providers. By diverting individuals with SMI from the justice system into housing, there is a reduction in jail costs and fewer admissions to crisis stabilization units/forensic treatment facilities.

#### 11. Program Performance:

# a. What is the specific purpose or goal that will be achieved by the funds requested?

The goal is to quickly divert homeless detainees with serious mental illnesses, who have a history of arrest or frequent police interactions, into community supportive housing. Referrals are made by the 11th Judicial Circuit Criminal Mental Health Project, area police departments, specialized homeless outreach teams and jail diversion behavioral health treatment provider(s).

#### b. What are the activities and services that will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Rapid Rehousing (short- to medium-term rental assistance) to assist clients with permanent housing placement in the community, providing housing navigation, case management and rental assistance to ensure exited clients remain stably housed in the community.

#### c. What are the direct services to be provided to citizens by the appropriations project?

The following direct services will be provided: 1. Housing Identification: through the use of housing navigators to recruit landlords and find safe, affordable units in proximity to the amenities needed by the clients, that meet client choice. Units will be secured within the limits of the clients income or potential income. 2. Rent and move-in assistance: The provider will guarantee the lease between the landlord and client for the period



enrollment in the RRH program. Move-in assistance will be provided in the form of needed household items and furniture to allow clients to immediately move into units. Support will be provided at only the level needed to stabilize the client in order to maximize resources. 3. Case Management and Services: Services are geared towards stabilizing the individuals in permanent housing by connecting individuals to mainstream services and supports. This includes benefits and employment assistance and support to navigate healthcare and behavioral systems.

# d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Homeless individuals with severe mental illness who have also been involved in the criminal justice system. Funding will provide Rapid Rehousing and supportive services to an estimated 30 individuals per year.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Individuals who remain linked to program services and successfully transition into permanent housing demonstrate significantly lower rates of re-arrest. In addition, those who remain engaged in housing and accompanying supportive services demonstrate significantly greater decreases in bookings and jail days over time. Identifying individuals at admission who have more extensive histories of criminal justice system involvement and homelessness may offer opportunities to better focus individual engagement strategies, stably housing individuals with SMI, support individuals in gaining income and reduced homelessness in Miami-Dade. The following measures will be used to measure these outcomes: 1. At least 35% served will gain economic self-sufficiency or maintain/improve economic self-sufficiency while enrolled in the program. 2. Number and rate of re-arrest of clients in the program 3. Number of persons enrolled in the program 4.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

Corrective action plans may be required for noncompliance, nonperformance, or unacceptable performance. Financial penalties may be imposed for failures to implement or to make acceptable progress on such corrective action plans. Increments of penalty imposition shall apply, unless DCF determines that extenuating circumstances exist, shall be based upon the severity of the noncompliance, nonperformance, or unacceptable performance that generated the need for corrective action plan.
