12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Meet current and future cybersecurity needs of the FPICN Data Center to proactively protect FPICN data systems from natural/man made threats that would prevent unfettered, real-time surveillance recognition and mitigation activities for the State. It is imperative that FPICN be capable of successfully resisting cyber-intrusion attempts, disruption, or malicious destruction of its patient care database, public health analysis capabilities, surveillance resources, and real-time reporting to DOH and national systems. real-time surveillance, data collation, analysis and reporting in response to existing and new public health threats. N/A is not considered a valid response.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Allow FPICN Data Center to operate without drawing on FPICN PCC patient care funding to exist; compounding PCC financial concerns. Allow FPICN Data Center to maintain mandated operational capabilities, including surge readiness, operational staff, critical systems, contractors and vendors to meet the escalating complexity and demand for real-time surveillance, data collection, analysis & reporting in response to new public health threats.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?



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Floridians will continue to have 24/7 access to certified and reliable health care professionals in their time of need relating to any poisoning or questions about poisons. This immediate expert care has been documented to save lives, time and healthcare resources. It will allow FPICN to maintain normal operational capabilities and surge readiness during increased public health crisis threatening all Floridians such as: Covid19, Red Tide/Blue Green Algae, Zika, flu, other viral health threats.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Reduced emergency department visits due to reliable care and triage from FPICN. Documented research showing that 50% of Floridians would go to the E.R. if they believed they had been exposed to a poison and had no trusted number to call.

Using this methodology and our total number of exposures would quickly show that having an available poison center significantly reduces health care costs, and demonstrates that the total funding of a poison control program is a fraction of the healthcare costs savings.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

For over 25 years, Florida's Poison Control Centers have met or exceeded its deliverables.
