#### 12. Program Performance

#### a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Placement of a Peace River Center MCRT Counselor in the Polk County Sheriff's Office 911 Communications Center will enable the 911 call takers to divert behavioral health calls to our trained MCRT crisis counselors. These calls could potentially be turned over to the Mobile Crisis Response Team for behavioral health intervention rather than a law enforcement intervention. Where appropriate, Deputies and MCRT Counselors stationed in the Outreach Offices would partner on the behavioral health crisis call. MCRT Counselors would then follow-up post intervention to ensure linkage to appropriate services. This MCRT Outreach presence would be 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

#### b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

1. Embed crisis counselors in law enforcement 911 call center 24/7/365 and Sheriff Outreach offices across Polk County in 12-hour shifts 7 days a week. 2. MCRT crisis counselors will join in or respond to crisis call questions received by the 911 call center; check available Peace River data base for prior mental health history of callers; provide advice and counsel to the 911 call dispatch and responding deputies during calls; dispatch other PRC crisis counselors as necessary to calls. 3. Dispatched crisis counselors will work with on-scene deputies to assess and de-escalate crisis situations; work with deputies to identify if community based services can meet the individual's needs or if a Baker Act is necessary; link individuals to community-based services to divert/avoid a Baker Act, if determined to be appropriate; provide post crisis assessment follow up after contact; provide follow up after discharge from an inpatient Baker Act stay within Polk County.



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c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Placement of MCRT staff in the Sheriff's Office Substations will allow MCRT staff to work closely with Deputies to assist in crisis intervention and follow up with individuals with mental health issues they may encounter in the community resulting in diverting arrests through addressing the presenting crises, connecting individuals to appropriate community-based resources, alleviating further crises, and when necessary, facilitating the Baker Act process as needed.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

PRC would be serving all ages of individuals who are in crisis or require follow up from a recent crisis situation. There will not be restrictions on access so that there are no barriers in terms of appropriate and equal access to care. There were 7,648 Baker Acts (BA) in Polk County with 22.75% associated with children for FY17/18 according the State Baker Act Annual Report (most recent published data). From FY 2011 to FY 2018 the total population of Polk County has grown by 9.89% while the growth in BA's for all ages has grown by approximately 109%. The number of Baker Acts associated with children (under age 18) has grown by approximately 139.5% (from 726 per year to 1,739 per year) with the adult population Baker Acts growing approximately 101.5% (from 2,932 per year to 5,909 per year). Involuntary examinations of individuals of all ages and specifically for minors have increased more rapidly than the population.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

This project will enable PRC to be present in and work alongside deputies in the 911 Call Center and Sheriff Outreach Offices across Polk County related to Baker Act and Marchman Act related calls, issues and follow-up. The goal is to reduce and divert individuals in our communities from required law enforcement Baker Act actions by de-escalating onscene situations, referral and linkage to outpatient community resources and services. A potential measure of success is a reduction of the percent of Baker Act calls resulting in inpatient crisis stabilization unit or hospitalization use (Baker Act Rate).

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Peace River Center would work with our Managing Entity and DCF to develop any necessary and appropriate penalties if performance measures are not achieved.
