Individuals from our rural five county (i.e. Jackson, Holmes, Washington, Calhoun and Liberty) service area interested in entering welding and construction trades vocations. Recruiting, targets unemployed and unskilled citizens who can fill positions that are necessary in recovery efforts.

#### be measured?

The expected benefit is a safe up to date facility for individuals training for vocations in the areas of welding and construction trades. Rapid credentialing and placement of students in jobs with high wages contribute to the district and Florida economies. The completion of the project is a cost effective way to have new programs that are needed now.
