12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Increase awareness of the opioid epidemic and engage in advocacy in communities engaging leaders in the business, faith and law enforcement communities. Assist individuals with opioid abuse and dependence problems that are incarcerated, court-involved or at-risk for court involvement recover through medication-assisted treatment for their addictions.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Paid and earned media coverage, social media engagement, technological outreach through webinars about the opioid epidemic along with specific engagement of leaders who can effect change to help save lives. Funds will be used to pay community treatment providers for provision of screening/education, medical assessments/lab work and extended-release injectable medication and expanding available treatment options.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Media coverage, social media engagement, technological outreach through webinars about the opioid epidemic along with specific engagement of leaders who can effect change to help save lives. Funds will be used to pay community treatment providers for provision of screening/education, medical assessments/lab work and extended-release injectable medication and expanding available treatment options, especially for those in the criminal justice system.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?



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The entire population of the state of Florida is the target population for the program, as the overdose crisis affects all demographics and communities. Project Opioid's studies indicate that minority populations are increasingly suffering from the increasing overdose rate as well whites in generational poverty, including in rural counties that lack resources. DCF and DOH have documentation/data supporting need and SAMHSA, FDA and the CDC strongly recommend for the use of medication-assisted as a best practice approach to serve individuals with opioid use disorders. Persons with poor mental health, people without jobs, economically disadvantaged people, homeless persons, drug users in the treatment system, high school students, college students, currently and formerly incarcerated people, drug offenders in the criminal justice system will all be subjects of the community treatment providers. We expect to serve thousands of individuals, in the over 800 category.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Tracking number of leader engagements for leader outcomes. Treated patients had 8 times more illicit opioid-free weeks after treatment for between 5 and 24 weeks and for treatment over 24 weeks, they were 14 times more likely to have success in treatment and 80% more likely to have illicit opioid-free weeks. DCF/FADAA program has a database that requires outcome information for every individual discharged from extended-release injectable services. Algorithm includes all individuals successfully completing or still actively engaged in treatment at time of discharge from MAT services divided by all individuals discharged from MAT services.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Non-compliance penalties for administrative work, service provision range from 2% to 10% of the total monthly invoices submitted.
