4. Project/Program Description

The Village of Indiantown's SW Lincoln Street Roadway and Drainage Reconstruction project will replace a failed, substandard residential street and drainage ditch, providing safe travel for residential, commercial, and emergency traffic. The existing roadway is in a state of failure and maintenance is no longer feasible; replacement is needed. The road has lost its profile, holds water, and has been patched dozens of times over the past several decades. The project will also install drainage pipe along the roadway edge to eliminate the roadside ditch immediately adjacent to the roadway causing further deterioration of the existing roadway. The town is less than three years old and is addressing infrastructure needs without any well-established tax base and reserve. Further, the infrastructure was previously unincorporated portions of Martin County that were not prioritized for maintenance.

12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Village of Indiantown is a rural community in Florida's Treasure Coast first established in the early 1900's, then incorporated on December 31, 2017, as the newest local government in Florida. The Village of Indiantown is located in western Martin County and has a population of approximately 6,000 residents in an area encompassing nine square miles. The main economic driver is agriculture. This project is intended to replace a failed roadway while also eliminating an unsafe drainage ditch immediately adjacent to the edge of the roadway. The project will increase vehicular safety by providing a modern, paved roadway and updated drainage to eliminate the adjacent ditch.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

This project is intended to provide surveying and engineering design of this needed roadway replacement and drainage system restoration project on Lincoln Street in Indiantown to rebuild a failing roadway and provide for a road shoulder by eliminating a roadside ditch and installing drainage pipe.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Construction of a modern, safe paved roadway service enhancing vehicular safety for residents, commercial traffic, and emergency services. The existing roadway is aged with a broken asphalt surface that is beyond repair. This project will minimize standing water, provide safer vehicular traffic corridor, and provide for a safer roadside drainage system.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population is a predominately minority residential population with an average income level mainly below median average income for the state. The area encompasses an estimated 3,500 residents.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will



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be measured?

Reconstructed road with drainage improvements. Measured by construction progress reports; an ongoing reduction in residential complaints, the cost and frequency of pothole repairs, and roadway maintenance; and decreased emergency services response times.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

The Village of Indiantown intends to utilize these funds for design and construction of the needed improvements. The intention is to assess 10% retainage withheld, performance bond and liquidated damages for noncompletion within contracted time frame, as well as understanding reimbursement to the state may be required for nonperformance. Standard contract penalties for the contract with the state are sufficient.
