	Over 30 percent of the 300,000 Florida children impacted by incarceration of parents/caregivers are 0-5 years old. Research shows that these children are acutely at-risk for anti-social behaviors, mental illness and cognitive delays stemming from exposure to Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE). Since 2012, five infants of Children of Inmates (COI) clients have passed away due to accidental death. COI's Babies 'n Brains Program seeks to halt this trend by providing support services for children ages 0-5 who have an incarcerated parent, including home safety visits, administering the Ages and Stages Questionnaire Assessment, and caregiver community supports program. COI offers an innovative approach to interrupt negative patterns by collaborating with state and local agencies to rebuild families with wellness and age-appropriate learning experiences that support children, caregivers, and incarcerated parents to improve the family uni

COI received two PPP loans in 2021 totaling \$370,316. The loans were critical to allow us to keep going and to provide the ongoing door-to-door or porch-to-porch care coordination support throughout the pandemic. Most of the funds were used for staff salaries who provided basic needs supports to families. Over 118,904 lbs. of food were delivered to homes as well as personal protective equipment, and child development and education resources. Assistance was provided for housing referrals and utility supports. COI also received funding from the City of Jacksonville to provide additional COVID-19 basic needs and child development supports through door-to-door outreach.

12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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When a parent is incarcerated, infants and young children suffer from insecure attachments and bonds to their parents. This insecurity undermines children's ability to cope and grow in a healthy manner. These broken bonds have been linked to diminished cognitive abilities and inabilities to establish positive relationships. Over 25% of children with incarcerated parents are under 5 years of age. COI works with the caregivers to provide safety and developmental supports. The program provide critical training on brain development and parenting within the correctional facilities to guide the incarcerated parent on how to support their child in overcoming these challenges and achieve a positive developmental track.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Babies 'N Brains provides inmate education on infant brain development and child wellness. In the community, 300 home visits are conducted as well as child safety assessments and Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ) for children ages 0-5 to measure appropriate maturation. Efforts will be made to help families establish a relationship with a primary care provider and enroll in healthcare, where possible. Over the past five years, five infants/young children of COI clients have passed away due to accidental deaths. As a result, COI staff will work to conduct home visits with 85% of households with children ages 0-5 to conduct home safety checks, provide safety equipment and assist with questions of caregivers about the child's development.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Inmate education on infant brain development and child wellness. 300 home visits, child safety assessments and Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ) for children age 0-5 to measure appropriate maturation. Direct services to assist with developmental stages and facilitated referrals to specialist to assist with developmental delays. Home safety assessments and home safety materials to 85% of households with children ages 0-5. Advocacy services will be provided to enhance public understanding of the plight of children of incarcerated parents.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population served by this project are children, ages 0-5 year of age with incarcerated parents and their caregivers. We serve currently and formerly incarcerated parents, assisting them to establish and maintain positive relationships with their children and caregivers. We anticipate serving 500 children with these funds. This equates to approximately 200 families or incarcerated individuals. Research from Cambridge University documents that children with incarcerated parents are at twice the risk of mental illness and three times the risk of antisocial behaviors. Many are economically disadvantaged and often face homelessness. Further, many within the COI population struggle with developmental disabilities and/or physical disabilities. Children with incarcerated parents are exposed to higher levels of community and direct violence.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected benefits are to interrupt intergenerational incarceration by identifying and working with children with incarcerated parents early in their development. Activities will reduce Adverse Childhood Experiences by teaching brain development and child safety precautions. Family visits will create strong bond between incarcerated parent, children and caregivers to promote healthy families. Improving parenting skills will be the focus during individual sessions, support groups and learning experiences for incarcerated parents, caregivers and children. Measures include pre-and post-surveys, and observational data using proven research tools and techniques, such as the Ages and Stages Assessment and other proven tools.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

\$1,000 financial consequence per child under 250 children to receive home visit and ASQ assessment. \$500 for every percentage under 85% of households with children five years old and under who do not receive a home safety assessment and supporting supplies.
