12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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OTLS' HD-ICT™ is an essential integrated component of OTLS comprehensive human infrastructure platform (HIP™) that offers an inclusive and equitable environment that promotes minority and population health and human capacitybuilding, while reducing and ultimately eliminating health disparities. OTLS' HD-ICT™ life solutions help communities foster a sustainable culture of health that enhances human health and well-being, strengthens community-based collaborations, connects research partners with health disparity communities, and advances action research. OTLS' capabilities approach provides practical tools to help Operation PAR constituents and community stakeholders improve: a) Health Outcomes by 10%; b) Reduce Mental Health Stigma; c) Access to Health Resources; d) Reduce Health Disparities; and e) Human Capabilities & Capacities to Address Social Determinants of Health.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

OTLS will work collaboratively with individual and community stakeholders to provide and deliver the following: -Community-Based Education Initiatives - Community-Based Participatory Research Strategies - Community Empowerment Activities - Community Capacity-Building Strategies - Evidence-Informed Intervention Modeling - Evidence-Based Community Engagement Strategies - Community-Based Health Coaching Initiatives - Community-Based Life Coaching Initiatives - Youth and Family Development Support - Technology Training.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

- The project will provide the following to citizens within our target beta community:
 Free License for OTLS' HD-ICT Enterprise Application Technology (Custom Life Plan and Life Support Services)
- Community-Based Training Seminars
- Community-Based Capacity-Building Workshops
- Individual, Family, and Community Counseling Services
- Educational Workshops (Workforce Development, STEM, Health, etc.)

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The initial target population served by this project will be constituents of Operation PAR, one of Florida's largest publicly funded non profit substance abuse and mental health services provider serving over 13,000 clients. In addition, Operation PAR has impacted more than 65,000 residents across Pinellas County. Leading in prevention, intervention and treatment of addiction and mental health services since 1970, Operation PAR helps children, adults and their families overcome their struggles with substance abuse and mental health.

The initial Beta Group size will include 150 patients (both inpatient and outpatient) within Operation PAR system of care. The Beta program includes 15 community agencies and 10 community action teams.

Age Ranges of Patients: 18 - 35 years of age

Gender: Both Male and Female

Ethnicity: African Americans, Hispanic/Latino, White, and Other

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

OTLS' methodology for measuring project outcomes and impacts: - Engage evidence-based research methods and best practices - Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's "Culture of Health" measures and methodology - Utilize technology infrastructure for information sharing, data collection, and program evaluation. Maximize use of multidisciplinary research partners to help analyze outcomes and impacts - Engage communities in community-based participatory research activities - Establish partnerships with research institutes (University of South Florida/FAMU) -Contract an external evaluation firm to conduct pre-, midterm, and post-evaluation.
