12. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The World Health Organization provides studies that have shown that vision impairment reduces quality of life due to isolation, anxiety, fear, and depression; poor mental health is a cause of worsening vision impairment; and that seniors who are visually impaired experience a greater number of falls, hip fractures, and a higher rate of mortality compared to their sighted peers. The program is tailored to older adults with disabilities to provide a holistic, person-centric approach to care.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Lighthouse will collaborate with other 501c3's that specialize in mental health, to add into the current curriculum used for Older Blind people. Classes and curriculum will be tailored to client individual needs and goals as determined during their initial assessment. Additional resources will be used or brought in based on the needs of the clients.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?



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The program is designed to empower clients to live more independently in their home and communities with a focus on improved mental health. This is done through independent living classes, orientation and mobility training and assistive technology trainings with curriculums focused around clients' physical, cognitive, leisure, social, psychological and emotional well-being.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population of the program are residents of Pasco, Hernando and Citrus counties over the age of 65 with blindness or significant visual impairments. 250 clients in this target population are expected to be served during the 2022-23 Fiscal Year. This has the potential to grow, especially during the isolation of a pandemic, the depression of vision loss and the growing senior population.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

85% of clients served will demonstrate improved mental well-being, improved overall feelings of happiness, and reduced social isolation or feelings of loneliness. As well as 85% of clients served will demonstrate improved abilities to care for themselves and their families at home and in the community. This is determined using a Comprehensive Functional Assessment before and after each program service with each client. It is also determined through program surveys conducted at the end of each portion of the program.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Should all funding not be spent on budgeted items necessary to support the number of clients recieving program services, the portion unspent will be returned.
