This will be achieved by providing services and activities that include workforce training, career exploration, OSHEA certification, employment and pre-apprenticeships to high school juniors and students.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

JA's initiatives focus on career exploration, skills training, job shadowing, entrepreneurship and pre-apprenticeship. These programs are proven ways to get high school students interested and engaged in careers across industries, teach valuable work skills and provide opportunities for students to obtain tech program or college credits and fill jobs.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target populations are economically disadvantaged persons, at-risk youth and high school students. 201-400 individuals are expected to be served.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will

be measured?

1.Improve quality of education: This will build the knowledge and application of critical work skill and prepare high school students for employment. This will be measured by Surveys of participants, pre-post tests and tracking of both completion of program and job placement resulting from program.

2. Increase or improve economic activity: Facilitate long-term employment opportunities for youth, particularly those who are at-risk. Employment data will be tracked long-term.

3. Enhance specific individual's economic self-sufficiency: High school students will be provided work training and opportunities for employment and will increase knowledge of soft/work skills, financial literacy, entrepreneurship and preapprenticeship.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Based on the fact that this is a program extension in the marine industry as well as a start-up pilot program in construction, would recommend that the time period for which to deliver the performance measures would be extended if that will allow completion
