14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



c. Organization Type

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Funding will expand Florida Early Learning Corps' geographic reach and impact on the early literacy and numeracy skill-building of our state's youngest learners. An appropriation amount of \$1M will facilitate Florida Early Learning Corps' expansion from 90 to 120 tutors who will serve more than 1700 at-risk students, ensuring they are prepared for success in Kindergarten.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Early Learning Corps is a proven model that accelerates literacy skills and Kindergarten readiness for high-need preschoolers. Full-time tutors work with PreK teachers to implement evidence-based interventions, individualized tutoring plans, formative assessments at least three times per year to ensure growth, extensive data systems that provide quality assurance, and multi-layer coaching.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The instructional model focuses on integrating the "Big Five" Essential Early Literacy Predictors outlined by the National Early Literacy Panel (2008) into all aspects of the daily classroom routine. The program includes an immersive "push-in" component, where tutors provide 1) whole-class literacy enrichment for all students, 2) targeted small group experiences, and 3) one-on-one interventions.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

In a state where more than 18% of children live in poverty, Florida Early Learning Corps serves those who are among the most at risk: 96% of Florida Early Learning Corps students are eligible to receive free and reduced price lunch, an indicator of poverty. This is higher than the average of Florida students overall (56.6%) (M-DCPS Statistical Highlights, 2021- 2022). Our 120 tutors will each serve 15 students resulting in more than 1,800 students receiving individualized tutoring support during the 2023-24 school year.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

We expect the following outcomes for student by the end of the 2022-23 school year:

- -90% of 4-5 year olds will meet or exceed their target growth in literacy and early numeracy skills needed for Kindergarten -80% of children will complete family literacy and numeracy activities at home with a parent or guardian
- -70% of all children will meet or exceed their age-level benchmarks for each skill.

Student outcomes are measured through the use of the PELI (Preschool Early Learning Indicators) assessment tool as well the EMI (Early Math Indicators) assessment tool, which are both administered to students in the fall, winter and spring.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

The suggested penalties if deliverables or performance measures are not met are loss of funding and impact on eligibility for future funding.
