14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The purpose of this project is to expand opportunities for high school students in the college's service district so that they have greater access to earn industry credentials and college credit while in high school at no cost to the student. This initiative supports the Governor's goal of making Florida the #1 state in the nation for workforce education by 2030 and focuses on in-demand workforce fields - Health Science and Information Technology.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Students will have access to an authentic and innovative education, one that will help them recognize their potential and reach their goals while bridging high school, college and career paths. The school will provide a unique accelerated secondary program to the community by offering an A.S. degree in either Health Science or Information Technology upon high school graduation at no cost to the student or their family. The school will foster an environment of high expectations, confidence and drive by keeping grade-level enrollment numbers small while providing strong social and academic support.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The high school will provide a unique opportunity to support students through their Florida public high school graduation requirements while also affording them the opportunity to earn their A.S. degree in one of the designated Health Sciences or Information Technology Education pathways and a minimum of two industry certifications. Graduates will then be able to enter the local workforce directly after high school graduation in a high paying job with no debt.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The charter school will ultimately serve students in grades 9-12 who would otherwise qualify to attend a public school in Alachua County. The school will have an open admissions policy and will be available to any rising 9th grader who submits an application prior to the posted application deadline. It is slated to open this fall with 75 students and will add 75 freshman each year after for a maximum enrollment of 300 students by year 4.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The school will provide a unique accelerated secondary program to the community through the offering of an A.S. degree upon high school graduation. Students will have greater access to highly sought-after academic and workforce programs while in high school. High school graduation rates and A.S. degree graduation rates will be the measurement of success for outcomes, as well school grades assigned by the state.
