Education programs for high school students that allow students to earn industry certifications, post-secondary credit, conduct clinical observations, secure internships/apprenticeships, and/or post-graduation employment promote the development of a sustainable career-ready workforce in healthcare fields

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Education programs for high school students that allow students to earn industry certifications, post-secondary credit, conduct clinical observations, secure internships/apprenticeships, and/or post-graduation employment promote the development of a sustainable career-ready workforce in healthcare fields - a direct benefit to the citizens of Seminole County and Central Florida

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

At-risk youth, high school students, students with disabilities and/or limited English proficiency.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Improve quality of education - Increase the number of graduates from Seminole County Public Schools who identify healthcare fields as their career pathway; increase number of graduates from Seminole County Public Schools who earn industry certifications and post-secondary credit related to healthcare; increase the number of graduates employed in the healthcare field post-graduation. Examine annual reports on students earning industry certification; survey students participating in courses; analyze graduating senior exit surveys. Increase or improve economic activity - Increase the number of graduates from Seminole County Public Schools completing career experiences in healthcare; increase the number of graduates from Seminole County Public Schools who identify healthcare as their future career pathway; reduce open positions for high school graduates in local healthcare facilities. Analyze district-collected records related to student internship/job shadow experiences in healthcare; sur
