14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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HOPE Court Broward will serve foster teens who will age out in state care, as well as the child welfare community that supports them. Youth develop personal goals, individualized action plans, life skills, and gain access to community supports and resources for their transition from the dependency system and to adulthood. HOPE is a therapeutic problem solving court founded in the theory and practical application of restorative practices, derived from the work of restorative justice.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

HOPE Court will provide a specialized problem solving court as well as transitional independent living supportive youth planning circles to foster youth aging out of state care, quarterly restorative practices and effective communication skills trainings for system of care professionals, and training plus consulting for judicial officers.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

HOPE Court will lead a specialized problem-solving court as well as three prongs of service to the child welfare community: transitional independent living planning completed restoratively through supportive youth circles with child welfare teams, effective communication skills trainings for system of care professionals and restorative based, trauma informed legal consulting for judicial officers.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population is: Persons with poor mental health, Jobless persons, Economically disadvantaged persons, Atrisk youth, developmentally disabled, physically disabled, drug users, high school students, current or former incarcerated persons, victims of crime and child welfare system professionals and members of judiciary. 101-200 individuals are expected to be served.

- e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?
- 1. Improve physical health: Minimum of 80% of participants will improve their overall physical health through their ability to identify and access available community supports, resources and services.
- 2. Improve mental health: Minimum of 80% of participants will improve their overall mental health through their ability to identify and access available community supports, resources and services.
- 3. Enhance specific individual's economic self sufficiency: Minimum of 80% of participants will improve their overall economic self sufficiency through their ability to identify and access available community supports, resources and services.
- 4. Improved service delivery: Minimum of 80% of participants will improve their overall professional service delivery through the successful completion of program training and linkage to experiential supports. All outcomes will be measured through participant's responses to program assessments.
