4. Project/Program Description

Captiva Island, along with nearby areas, was severely impacted by September 2020's Hurricane Ian. Captiva's beaches underwent significant sand loss as a result, especially in the sand template of the dry beach. FDEP reported the total need for this project is \$13,243,200 in their post-Ian recovery plan. We have been given verbal verification that recently allocated funds through SB 4A will cover 48% of the project. The recovery plan noted it is unlikely this project is eligible for federal support. We are requesting the remaining \$6,886,464 needed to return Captiva's beaches to their state pre-hurricane. This will result in continued flood protection for Captiva and support its tourism industry.

14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

FDEP reported the total need for this project is \$13,243,200 in their post-lan recovery plan. We have been given verbal verification that recently allocated funds through SB 4A will cover 48% of the project. The recovery plan noted it is unlikely this project is eligible for federal support. We are requesting the remaining \$6,886,464 needed to return Captiva's beaches to their state pre-hurricane. This will result in continued flood protection for Captiva and support its tourism industry.



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b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Upcoming funds to be distributed by FDEP are expected to only cover ~48% of total project costs. It is very uncertain that Captiva's beaches qualify for Federal funds (USACE, FEMA) to cover the remainder of the project as noted in FDEP's post-lan dune and beach recovery plan. Requested funds will be used to cover the remaining costs of renourishing the beach to its pre-hurricane condition.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Funding the remainder of Captiva's beach renourishment needs is expected to provide invaluable storm protection to Captiva's \$1.5 billion in property values including critical transportation routes and infrastructure, to re-establish important habitat for nesting sea turtles and shore birds, and to restore beach safety and access for residents and visitors.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

This project will benefit Captiva residents, businesses, and over 180,000 yearly visitors. More than 180,000 individuals are expected to gain benefits from this project on a yearly basis.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will

be measured?

Complete beach renourishment to pre-hurricane conditions will provide multiple benefits. Wildlife habitat will be reestablished including for nesting sea turtles and shorebirds. Beach sand will be supplemented by sand clean of debris and toxins introduced by the hurricane, making local beaches safer. Beaches and dunes provide important storm protection to Captiva's \$1.5 billion in property value, and to critical transportation routes and public infrastructure. Most of these can be measured by renourishing to pre-hurricane state and by pre- and post-monitoring. Renourishing the beach will protect Captiva's economy which relies on tourism in the form of beach visitation. This can be monitored using local visitation and economic statistics.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

CEPD will negotiate a time extension in order to provide deliverables or the return of funds.
