14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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Expanding the Indian River County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) will enhance Indian River County Department of Emergency Service's (IRCDES) ability to respond / recover to disasters and will directly increase the resiliency of our communities. This project will contribute to the "National Preparedness Goal" as outlined by FEMA implementing these changes.

The project will add 10,000 square feet to an existing 20,000.00 square foot facility.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

This expansion shall provide adequate work space, be designed and constructed using the latest building codes to enforce climate resiliency posed by natural hazards. This expansion of the current EOC will provide a centralized location for IRCDES to function, train, safely store critical equipment, and house critical staff members 24 hours per day during disasters. The EOC expansion facility shall include a full-service kitchen, which shall add significant resiliency to the IRCDES. Additionally, this EOC expansion shall include charging stations with support for on-site electrical infrastructure. Which will reduce IRC's carbon emissions and our need for gasoline resources.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

With these improvements to the EOC it will ensure the long-term health and safety of its staff during all hazardous events which will enhance response and recovery operations to our affected communities.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

This project will benefit all of Indian River County's 161,000 population. Including elderly persons, persons with poor mental and physical health, jobless persons, economically disadvantaged persons, at-risk youth, homeless, developmentally and physically disabled, drug users and offenders, preschool, grade school, high school, university/college students, currently or formerly incarcerated persons, victims of crime.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The benefit will be to enhance Indian River County Department of Emergency Services (IRCDES) ability to respond / recover to disasters and directly increase the resiliency of our communities. This project shall directly support and contribute to the "National Preparedness Goal" as outlined by FEMA. This project will close up any performance gaps that exist in our Operational Coordination and Environmental Response / Health and Safety of our EOC staff for our communities. The outcome will be measured by the rapid deployment of staff and materials after a disaster.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Should Indian River County not utilize the funding allocated by the State of Florida to fund the Public Works/Emergency Operations Center, the County of Indian River will be required to return the funding to the State of Florida.
