4. Project/Program Description

Enterprise Village is an innovative solution to ending homelessness for single men in Jacksonville, FL. The campus will include: 100 units of affordable housing; 80 units of emergency housing; case management; a comprehensive Federally Qualified Health Center providing primary care, behavioral health, dental, vision, and free and reduced cost medications; a job training and job placement facility; and a manufacturing facility providing jobs for residents. Sulzbacher has purchased a 17-acre property for the project. The City of Jacksonville is a key partner, appropriating 12 million in American Rescue Plan funding for the project, and two million in Federal funding has been secured.

14. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Enterprise Village is an innovative solution to ending homelessness for single men in Jacksonville, FL. The campus will include: 100 units of affordable housing; 80 units of emergency housing; case management; a comprehensive Federally Qualified Health Center providing primary care, behavioral health, dental, vision, and free and reduced cost medications; a job training and job placement facility; and a manufacturing facility providing jobs for residents.



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b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The funds will be used for the construction of the buildings on the Enterprise Village campus, consisting of 180 units of housing for homeless men, a Healthcare facility, and a jobs and training facility. The funds will not be used for the manufacturing facility.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Health Services provided include primary care, dental, vision, behavioral health and free and reduced cost medications. Social services provided include emergency and permanent housing, case management, job training and job placement. Educational services include a variety of certification programs in construction, food services, and healthcare. By incorporating housing, job training and job placement, comprehensive healthcare, and supporting all these services and opportunities with Case Management focused on long-term housing stability, Enterprise Village will be an innovative solution to ending homelessness for single, adult males.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population is homeless, adult males, and the campus will serve over 8,000 people annually for housing, healthcare and job services. This will include Veterans, men who are chronically homeless, and men recently discharged from a hospital who require recuperative, respite care. The housing will serve 180 men, Healthcare will serve over 8,000 patients annually. The single male demographic that Sulzbacher currently serves across all programs is 61% Black, 35% White, 3% Multi-racial, and 1% American Indian, Alaskan or Hawaiian Native. The age demographics are 7% 18-24 years old, 23% 25-39 years old, 33% 40-55 years old, 31% 56-64 years old, and 6% 65 and over.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The project will end homelessness for 100 men by providing 100 units of permanent housing with supportive services on-site. To improve physical health, the project will provide a medical home for over 8,000 patients annually. To improve mental health, the project will increase access to mental health services for 800 homeless and low-income patients. To increase economic self-sufficiency, the project will provide assistance with resume writing and job searching, and employment for 417 adults, and will provide special training opportunities in manufacturing, culinary arts, or other job training for 200 clients per year. To reduce recidivism, the project will divert 40 clients annually from the jail system who are repeat offenders and place them in housing with wrap-around services, resulting in 80% drop in re-arrest rate.
