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a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Museum's request this year would build on the state's previous investment that has enabled essential building improvements to ensure a safe and secure educational environment for students and visitors by supporting the design, development, and technology required to mount a state-of-the-art immersive, educational theatre space within The Museum, allowing students, scholars and visitors of future generations to communicate with Holocaust survivors forever.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The Museum's pioneering Dimensions in Testimony¿ (DIT) project, developed in concert with the Shoah Foundation, uses Artificial Intelligence (AI) and natural voice technology to allow visitors, students and researchers to ask questions of Holocaust survivors about their life experiences and hear responses in real-time, lifelike conversations. This ensures that students and visitors can forever engage in conversations with survivors in real-time and hear their stories from their own voices.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

In addition to conversations with a survivor, this interior educational space would also be used to present Holocaust-relevant programming, including orientation for students and visitors, presentations by survivors and their descendants, discussions led by researchers and experts, and Holocaust-related films and documentaries produced by filmmakers in Florida and globally. These crucial resources will honor the memory of millions of innocent men, women and children who suffered or died in the Holocaust and help to ensure that future atrocities never occur.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

A new safe and technologically infused education center for over 1300 teachers, 300,000 students, and 24,000 individuals who are impacted through the Museum's educational programs, survivor talks, and commemorations each year.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The orientation experiences and Dimensions in Testimony; will be free to all school groups and free with admission to scholars and the public. An orientation film specifically designed for students will be adapted to single-screen format and included in The Museum's dynamic "Teaching Trunk" curriculum, which includes grade-appropriate learning materials, available free of charge, shipped to students and teachers across the state to meet the requirements of state statute and the Next Generation Sunshine Standards. Outcomes will be measured through student, educator and visitor surveys and increases in the number of students, teachers, scholars etc. visiting the museum.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for the contract?

Disbursed funds for deliverables not met will be returned to the state.
