a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

State appropriation funds for disaster recovery and basic needs resource guides will support Florida residents in recovering from 2024 disasters and preparing for future events by improving access to vital information for finding short and long term recovery services and support. The broader distribution of updated essential need info to connect those at risk will further enhance community preparedness and strengthen resilience.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Our services will support recovery from the 2024 natural disasters and preparing for future ones:

- Research: Update & verify information in our Disaster Recovery and Basic Needs Guides.
- Translation: Printed guides in English and Spanish; online versions in 20+ languages.
- Printing: Bilingual guides, QR code wallet cards, & signage
- Wider Distribution & Marketing
- c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Our Disaster Recovery & Basic Needs Guides offer info on where to find essential services for residents impacted by natural disasters and those preparing for future events. These include emergency shelters, recovery programs, financial aid, mental health support, & rebuilding resources. They also provide preparedness tips, emergency plans, & local contacts to aid in effective response & recovery.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

At risk residents before, during and after disaster, including but not limited to elderly persons; persons with poor mental health; persons with poor physical health; homeless; developmental or physically disabled, and anyone in harms way or affected by an impending natural disasters or its aftermath. Estimated number to be served is contingent on weather but will be more than 1000.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Improved physical health with reduced injury, illness due to access to services and preparedness.

Improved mental health due to access to info for reduced stress and coping

Protection from harm with reduced loss of life, property, and crime due to preparedness, faster recovery & resilience. Enhance individual & family economic sufficiency with reduced dependance on external aid due to resource access. Measures include survey data, economic tracking, health data on illness, injury & death.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

To ensure accountability and effective service, if Making An Impact fails to meet deliverables, penalties may include: Financial: Fines or funding deductions for delays or inadequate coverage.
