13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

When operational, Camp Wesumkee offered unique experiences for Girl Scouts across Florida to engage in hands-on learning about marine and coastal ecosystems through tidal pool observations, swimming, camping, and additional science activities. Restoring this property will allow Girl Scouts across Florida to participate in weekend outdoor experiences, summer camps, and events as well as bring attention to the Florida Keys.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Girl Scouts of Tropical Florida will offer year-round outdoor experiences to the nearly 40,000 Girl Scouts throughout Florida.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The camp will mostly be used by Girl Scouts within Florida although citizens can rent out the camp during weekdays or select weekends when it is not in use by girls.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Camp Wesumkee restoration will primarily serve the 3,000+ Girl Scouts in Miami-Dade and Monroe Counties as well as nearly 40,000 Girl Scouts throughout the State of Florida. Once restored, the camp will also be open to millions of Girl Scouts across the US as a destination camping experience, supporting the Florida economy.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Based on the results from the State of the Florida Girl Report (2024), girls are full of potential but living in crisis. It is critical to prioritize girls, address their gender specific needs, and making critical investments to ensure all Florida girls can live to their fullest potential. We know that the more time girls spend outdoors, the better they do over the course of their lives. Restoring Camp Wesumkee will allow girls to learn about Florida's fragile ecosystem while participating in gender specific activities. This is a double investment opportunity – in the future of girls and the future of our environment.
