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a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

WCI creates human resource hubs in high-poverty neighborhoods where children and families can access rigorous year-long academic programming through our summer and after school academies that center the curricula around the cultivation of a community garden, workforce job training, food distribution, mental health counseling, home buyer and financial management workshops, and affordable housing available to purchase. Our goal is to maximize our community partnerships to scale our approach to four total sites.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The funds will specifically empower residents of each neighborhood to access social services provided by our community partners, emergency food assistance, academic enrichment and tutoring, mental health counseling, coordinated care and case management, and health screening services, at little to no cost.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Citizens will receive the following direct services: access to social services provided by community partners, emergency food assistance, academic enrichment and tutoring, mental health counseling, coordinated care and case management, and health screening services. All services will be provided at little to no cost to residents.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population are children and families who reside in high-poverty zip codes. A WCI resource hub will be located in each high-poverty neighborhood where the average educational attainment is a high school diploma with low homeownership rates. Approximately 1,000 Miami-Dade residents will be impacted annually.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

In the short run, expected outcomes include increased reading and STEM proficiencies in disadvantaged students, increasing the number of community gardens in Miami-Dade, increase in affordable housing placements, and access to free or affordable health and counseling services. In the long run, expected outcomes include an increase in college graduation rates, homeownership rates, employment, and nutritional foods among the residents of the neighborhood, ultimately resulting in the closing of the wealth, health, and academic gaps.
