The S.A.R.A. Opioid Prevention Program works to raise awareness of substance misuse and opioid abuse among youth in Miami-Dade and Broward counties, focusing on the dangers of vaping, prescription medications, and opioids. The program educates both young people and their families about the long-term effects of these substances, with a particular emphasis on prescription opioid misuse and fentanyl. Through year-round efforts, including social media campaigns, in-school and out-of-school workshops, and community events, we aim to promote a healthier and safer Florida. Additionally, we advocate for stronger laws to prevent vaping and the sale of vapes in schools, and we support the development of ordinances restricting tobacco retailers from operating within a certain distance of schools and areas where citizens live, learn, work, and play. We also advocate for requiring permits for mobile dealers of tobacco and vape products to ensure better regulation and control.

13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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The specific purpose of the S.A.R.A Opioid Prevention Program is to combat substance misuse, with a particular focus on opioid misuse, prescription medication abuse, fentanyl, and vaping, across Miami-Dade and Broward counties. The funds will be used to educate youth and families on the dangers of these substances, including the deadly risks of fentanyl, as well as raise awareness of prescription medication misuse and vaping. In addition to the workshops, the funds will support social media campaigns, community outreach events, and advocacy efforts to strengthen laws preventing vaping in schools and restricting tobacco and vape sales near schools and public spaces. This comprehensive approach will help reduce substance misuse, raise awareness, and promote healthier choices among Florida's youth and families.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

This program targets substance misuse in Miami-Dade/Broward through:

1. In-School Education

Monthly workshops for 10K–15K students (grades 6–12) on opioid/fentanyl risks, vaping, and prescription misuse, using interactive peer resistance training.

Small Groups Program: Weekly peer-led sessions for at-risk youth, focusing on coping skills, refusal tactics, and mentorship.

2. Family/Community Engagement

Quarterly workshops for parents/guardians on identifying behavioral risks, secure medication storage, and overdose reversal training.

Community health fairs and town halls with multilingual resources and partnerships with local healthcare providers.

3. Youth Advocacy

100+ students/yeár trained to lead #StopUsingTheYouth campaigns and advocate for laws restricting vape sales near schools

4. Policy Reform

Partnering with officials to ban school vaping and regulate retailers near schools

Funds Cover: Staff, workshops, small group materials, events, social media and evaluation

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The S.A.R.A. Opioid Prevention Program will provide key services to citizens in Miami-Dade and Broward counties, including monthly in-school workshops to educate youth on the dangers of opioid misuse, fentanyl, prescription drugs, and vaping. Out-of-school workshops and community events will engage families, offering resources and prevention strategies. The program will also develop social media campaigns, advocate for stronger laws against vaping in schools, and empower youth to lead the "Stop Using the Youth" campaign, advocating for stricter regulations on substance sales. This comprehensive approach aims to reduce substance misuse, raise awareness, and empower communities to take action for a safer, healthier future.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population for the S.A.R.A. Opioid Prevention Program includes youth in grades 6-12, along with their families, in Miami-Dade and Broward counties. The program aims to serve 50 schools across both counties, impacting approximately 10,000-15,000 students throughout the year, along with their families through community events and outreach. By offering in-school workshops, out-of-school workshops, and social media campaigns, the program seeks to raise awareness, provide prevention strategies, and empower both youth and their families to address substance misuse in their communities.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected outcome of the S.A.R.A. Opioid Prevention Program is a significant reduction in substance misuse, particularly opioid abuse, prescription medication misuse, fentanyl, and vaping, among youth in Miami-Dade and Broward counties. Additionally, the program aims to empower youth to become leaders in advocating for stronger regulations on substance sales and usage. The success of this initiative will be measured through various methods, including pre- and post-program surveys to assess changes in knowledge, attitudes, and behaviors regarding substance abuse. The program will also track attendance at workshops, engagement levels in social media campaigns, and the impact of youth-led advocacy efforts through participation rates and community feedback. Through these data points, the program will evaluate its effectiveness in raising awareness, reducing substance misuse, and fostering a culture of prevention and advocacy within the community.
