#### 13. Program Performance

#### a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Sight in Schools Children's Vision Program brings vital vision healthcare services—including vision screenings, comprehensive eye exams, and prescription glasses—to children in Northeast FL. We work to eliminate treatable vision problems for students in Title 1 schools so they can have a better chance at success in school, and in life. Good vision is vital for academic, social, and emotional development. Untreated vision issues hinder learning and make navigating daily tasks challenging.

#### b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Our objectives for the Sight in Schools Program during the 2025-2026 year are to:

- Conduct 35,000 vision screenings for children, enabling the early detection of eye diseases and vision issues.
- Provide 2,500 comprehensive eye exams for K-12 students in Northeast Florida, with the goal of eliminating treatable vision problems.

#### c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Over 35,000 children will receive vision screenings, which are vital for the early detection of vision issues and eye diseases. Through our Sight in Schools Program, our licensed optometrist provides comprehensive eye exams directly on school campuses using our Mobile Vision Clinic. We target low-income K-12 students, with a focus on Duval and Clay counties, who otherwise go without vision care.

#### d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

For our school-based eye exams, we focus on low-income K-12 students in Northeast Florida public schools (with a focus on Duval and Clay counties), who are at greater risk of missing out on essential eye care. Our target population for vision screenings includes children aged 3 to 18 in Northeast Florida (Duval, Baker, Clay, Nassau, and St. Johns counties). Annually, we provide screenings to over 35,000 children across the First Coast in preschools, child development centers, and private, and independent schools throughout Northeast Florida.

### e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Addressing vision issues removes barriers to academic success, enabling students to reach their full potential and improving the effectiveness of efforts to boost grade-level reading proficiency. Higher academic achievement in school often leads to pursuing higher education, access to a wider range of career opportunities, and ultimately improving long-term health and socioeconomic prospects. We measure program impact by tracking screenings, results, follow-ups, eye exams, glasses prescribed, referrals, and clinics held, along with demographic data to target under served areas. Weekly reports monitor progress. Surveys conducted 90 days post-clinics and feedback from students and staff assess outcomes like improved behavior, confidence, and progress.

### f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

In addition to contractual penalties, the contracting agency would not be eligible for future funding opportunity.
