### 13. Program Performance



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### a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

CAP supports parental choice by providing high-quality arts education and career-focused field trips to prepare students for economic self-sufficiency:

- 1. Deliver arts education to 365 students in charter schools, homeschools, military families, and residential crisis care. These students often face increased risks of trauma and social isolation. Arts education improves mental well-being, fosters teamwork, develops communication skills, and reduces the likelihood of justice system involvement.
- 2. Promote academic success with CAP participants achieving over 80%+ gains in academic, mental focus, and engagement.
- 3. Support military families by addressing unique needs with tailored on-base teacher training and programming focused on students' academic learning and mental well-being.
- 4. Build career readiness through rigorous instruction and workforce centered field trips.
- 5. Reduce student behavioral issues with smaller classes and focus on accountability and teamwork.

### b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

CAP programs foster academic, character, and communication skills, preparing students for success in school, postsecondary education, the workforce, and life. CAP students score an average of 7 points higher on standardized math and reading tests and show over 80%+ improvement in problem-solving and task completion, reflecting enhanced selfdiscipline and academic engagement.

- -Military Teachers and Students: Tailored on-base teacher training and programming focus on academics while building communication skills to help students manage the stress of family deployment.
- -Homeschool Students: Group instruction at homeschool sites features home-education-specific lessons and field trips designed for career exploration.
- -Charter School Students: In-school and after-school arts education that incorporates career-focused instruction+field trips to UNF.
- -Crisis Care Youth: Therapeutic arts interventions aim to support emotional well-being and prevent youth from entering the justice system.

### c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Military Students: Group arts classes focus on communication and community-building to reduce isolation caused by trauma from family deployment.

Military Teachers: Tailored on-base training equips teachers to help students manage deployment-related stress through the arts.

Homeschool Students: Home-education-specific curricula offer low student-to-teacher ratios, focused arts instruction, and field trips designed for career development.

Charter School Students: Rigorous arts instruction paired with career exploration opportunities prepares students for future success.

Crisis Care Youth: Therapeutic arts interventions foster positive attitudes and help prevent youth from entering the justice system.

### d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

365 students from charter schools, homeschool families, military families, and residential crisis care residing in Duval, St. Johns, Nassau, and Clay counties will receive a variety of high-quality, yearlong arts education programs. CAP's yearlong education programs serve as a preventative measure for issues impacting student well-being while creating opportunities to explore career paths for greater economic self-sufficiency.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?



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Using rubric, pre and post program student evaluations will demonstrate the following:

- Improved mental focus: 85% will report improved ability to set goals and work on a task from beginning to end.
- Improved social engagement: 85% will report improvement in participation in class sessions.
- Improved ability to solve problems: 80% will report improved reasoning and problem solving skills.
- Improved communication skills with peers and adults: 80% will report improved communication skills.
- Skill based learning: 90% will report improvement in their arts discipline specific skills.
- Academic achievement: 80% will report improved academic engagement.

### f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

Suggested penalties for failing to meet deliverables provided for in the contract is a reduction in the amount of the monthly payment after finding substantial evidence of non-delivery of service(s) as required by the Contract. The suggested penalty for failing to meet performance measures provided for in the contract is a review of the deficiency to determine if it is critical, major, or minor. If it is a critical deficiency or minor deficiency, the opportunity to work with prevention staff to correct and close out the deficiency. If it is a major deficiency, an Outcome Based Corrective Action Plan will be created and submitted to the Department for review and approval.
