This database ensures DOE, OPB and Legislature have optics into debt issued by districts as well as all bond referendum language and news articles. Insures debt ratios are met per state statute. System also helps small districts bids get a larger and more competitive roup of bidders saving the taxpayers money. District administrators also use the system to guide first time uperintendents in bond referendum process.
