13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Funds will provide the Family-Match technology to help case workers achieve permanency for legal orphans in Florida. Family-Match promotes placement stability by assessing child-family relational fit, aiding agencies in selecting suitable families, and supporting families throughout the adoption process. This aligns with the state's interest in child well-being and reducing foster care numbers, benefiting the state through improved child welfare outcomes and reduced foster care costs.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Family-Match supports agencies by providing a centralized, data-driven tool to sustain various recruitment strategies and increasing the pool of foster/adoptive families. It also offers matching technology with a centralized repository of families, helping workers find the best placements based on critical data. These benefits lead to improved child welfare outcomes and reduced foster care costs.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Family-Match supports agencies by providing a centralized, data-driven tool to sustain various recruitment strategies and increasing the pool of foster/adoptive families. It also offers matching technology with a centralized repository of families, helping workers find the best placements based on critical data. These benefits lead to improved child welfare outcomes and reduced foster care costs. Likewise, Family-Match provides Florida families with a streamlined, compatibility-based matching process to connect with child welfare professionals from across the state, looking to recruit foster or adoptive families, or match children who are eligible for adoption with an adoptive family. Lastly, by offering services to both agencies and families, Family-Match helps children in Florida's foster care system with a goal of adoption by enabling caseworkers to identify, evaluate, and match with families that provide the best relational fit, fostering successful and lasting adoptions.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population served by Family-Match are children who have a goal of adoption, and no family identified to adopt them, hopeful adoptive families, and child welfare professionals. The population of children in foster care who have a goal of adoption are in excess of 800 across the state. These children have more complex medical, emotional, or cognitive needs, are older, and/or be part of a sibling set. Hopeful foster and adoptive families who are current and active total over 2200. Child welfare professionals across all circuits, CBCs, and supporting providers total over 450.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected outcome of the Family-Match project is to improve the quality of life for foster children by facilitating successful and stable adoptions. By equipping adoption workers with advanced technology, the program enables efficient and effective identification of adoptive families with the highest probability of achieving long-term, stable placements. Family-Match has demonstrated success in reducing time to match, increasing finalized adoptions for children considered hardest-to-place, and minimizing adoption disruptions. These outcomes lead to significant, long-term benefits, including improved physical and mental health, enhanced educational success, greater self-sufficiency, and reduced reliance on other state systems. The methodology for measuring these outcomes includes tracking the number of matches, placements, and finalized adoptions within the system. Additionally, the Florida Safe Families Network can be utilized to further analyze and quantify the programs impact.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?



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Adoption-Share's current contract with DCF (LJ217) stipulates six performance measures and corresponding penalties for failure to meet outcomes. Performance measures include but are not limited to the accessibility of the application, trainings, help desk support, and demonstrated increase of prospective adoptive parents for waiting children. Penalties range from \$400 to \$4,375.00 and are dependent on the performance measure. To date no penalty has been exercised as the org has met outcomes.
