13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Project's goal is to offer tailored mental health support to help survivors of exploitation to recover emotionally and rebuild their lives.

Individual Therapy: Survivors receive one-on-one counseling to process trauma, reduce anxiety and depression, and build coping skills.

Group Therapy: Survivors connect with others in supportive group sessions to reduce isolation and foster a sense of community.

Creative and Alternative Therapies: Survivors can participate in equine therapy, sound baths, and art and music therapy to express emotions, reduce stress, and promote healing in unique and meaningful ways. Family Counseling: Mothers and children participate in sessions to rebuild trust, improve communication, and creaté a stable home environment. Ongoing Emotional Support: Survivors receive regular check-ins and crisis support to navigate challenges and build resilience.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Each survivor will have a case manager to create and follow a plan tailored to their individual needs and goals.

Survivors will be connected to resources like housing, healthcare, education, and job opportunities.

Mental Health Services: One-on-One Counseling: Private sessions to help survivors heal emotionally and develop healthy coping skills. Group Support: Safe spaces where survivors can connect with others and share their experiences. Creative Healing Activities: Programs such as equine therapy, sound baths, and art and music therapy to help survivors relax, express emotions, and recover.

Family Support: Counseling for mothers and children to rebuild trust and strengthen their relationships.

Parenting workshops to help mothers create stable and supportive homes. Life Skills Training: to teach survivors practical skills like managing money, preparing for jobs, and handling stress. Support for continuing education and career planning. Community Partnerships to expand resources.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Direct Services will include but not be limited to

Survivor Support: individualized service-centered case management, life skills training, medical assistance, mental health therapy, education assistance, and emergency assistance.

Youth Education: An updated app and outreach to teach children about trafficking prevention.

Community Awareness: Campaigns, events, and partnerships to educate and engage the public. Enhanced Services: Training for staff and expanded access through additional hires.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Target Population:

Survivors of human trafficking and exploitation, including mothers and their children.

Community members and stakeholders, including schools, healthcare providers, and local organizations, to raise awareness and foster advocacy.

Expected Reach:

Survivors: Approximately 120 individuals, including direct support for mothers and children.

Youth: 500+ children educated through the updated app and outreach efforts.

Community Members: 1,000+ individuals engaged through awareness campaigns, events, and partnerships.

Expected Benefits/Outcomes: Empower survivors with life skills, stable housing, and economic independence. Educate youth on trafficking prevention through an updated app and outreach. Raise community awareness through events and partnerships. Enhance organizational capacity with expanded staff and improved training. Measurement Methodology: Track survivor outcomes (e.g., housing, employment, and program participation). Measure outreach impact via event attendance and campaign reach. Evaluate staff performance and client satisfaction. Success will be assessed through data and feedback from participants and partners.
