13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The specific purpose of the requested funds is to strengthen early childhood development by integrating the evidence-based Reach Out and Read model into pediatric care. This will be achieved by providing training to medical providers, and residency programs, developmentally appropriate books to children, offering parents guidance on shared reading, and using books for developmental surveillance during well-child visits, fostering improved literacy, relational health, and long-term well-being for children.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The funds will support the implementation of the evidence-based Reach Out and Read model. Activities and services include training clinicians to deliver literacy guidance, providing developmentally and culturally appropriate books during well-child visits, educating parents on the importance of shared reading, and using books for developmental surveillance. These services foster early literacy, strengthen parent-child relationships, and support healthy child development.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The appropriation project will provide direct services to families with children from birth to age 5 by integrating the evidence-based Reach Out and Read model into pediatric care. Clinicians will distribute developmentally appropriate books during well-child visits, educate parents on the importance of shared reading for early literacy and development, and use books to assess developmental milestones, fostering stronger family bonds and school readiness.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

This project targets pediatric providers, residency programs, and families with children from birth to age 5, with a focus on under-resourced communities, high Medicaid populations, and rural areas. In Florida, it currently promotes early childhood development and literacy through pediatric care, reaching over 600,000 well-child visits and approximately 300,000 families annually. With strong community support, the program operates in 287 pediatric clinics across 41 counties, creating a meaningful statewide impact.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The project aims to improve early literacy, strengthen parent-child bonds, boost school readiness, and support healthy child development. It reduces toxic stress and fosters cognitive, social, and emotional well-being, particularly in rural areas. Outcomes will be tracked via clinician observations, parent-reported reading, milestone assessments, and evaluations of book distribution and literacy guidance. ROR is the only pediatric-based literacy model endorsed by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), validated by 20+ peer-reviewed studies.
