13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The \$445,000 in State Appropriation funding will support the FNFA Collaborative in advancing food security, health access, nutrition education, and community development across some of Miami-Dade County's vulnerable neighborhoods (i.e., Homestead, Goulds, Kendall, South Miami, Overtown, Little Havana, & Liberty City). Funds will enhance urban farms, pantries, and health hubs through infrastructure investments, expand nutrition education and engagement, improve food system data tracking, and provide capacity-building support. FNFA will serve 15,000+ residents annually, strengthening nonprofits, health, & enhancing our food system.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The FNFA Collaborative, led by UHP, will enhance food security, nutrition education, & health access in Miami-Dade County's vulnerable communities by improving infrastructure, expanding services, & strengthening capacity-building efforts. This initiative will upgrade 3 urban farms, 3 pantries, & 3 hubs, while supporting programs to increase access to fresh, healthy foods. FNFA will provide 15 nutrition workshops, 12 workforce trainings, & 3 garden-based experiences to equip residents, small businesses, & nonprofits, while also enhancing data-driven food system coordination, trainings, & communications to improve collaboration.

- c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?
- Food & Health Hubs: Increasing access to health services and nutritious, locally grown food through a strengthened food access infrastructure.
- Education & Engagement: Providing culturally relevant nutrition programs and health resources for low-income, food-insecure communities.
- · Capacity Building & Workforce Development: Expanding training opportunities for community leaders, small businesses, and nonprofits in the food and health sectors.
- d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?
- 15,000+ residents served annually through food access programs, nutrition education, and workforce training.
- · Increased food security and health outcomes for vulnerable communities.
- · Stronger local food systems through sustainable policy and infrastructure investments.

By implementing these key activities and services, FNFA will create long-term food security solutions that address the root causes of hunger and health disparities affecting our most vulnerable (i.e., youth, elderly, and low-income families) exclusively in the south & southeastern areas of Miami-Dade County.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The FNFA Collaborative will enhance food security, health, nutrition education, & community growth in Miami-Dade County, benefiting 15,000+ residents in focus/target communities, by 1) upgrading 3 urban farms, 3 pantries, and 3 hubs; 2) expanding nutrition education (15 culturally tailored workshops); & 3) building stakeholder capacity (15 development sessions). FNFA will also 4) strengthen data-driven decision-making, communications, & coordination (public system dashboard). Progress will be measured via program participation, infrastructure improvements, training assessments, dashboard utilization, regular check-ins, & an impact report.
