13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The project aims to enhance the emotional intelligence (EI) of at-risk youth, resulting in improved decision-making, reduced risky behaviors such as substance abuse and violence, and increased academic and career success. It will promote safer communities and economic self-sufficiency among participants. The outcomes will be measured using preand post-program assessments of EI competencies, participant attendance and completion rates, and surveys from participants and stakeholders. Long-term tracking will evaluate improvements in academic performance, employment placements, and reductions in recidivism.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The program will deliver activities and services such as emotional intelligence training, life skills workshops, and mentorship programs to equip participants with self-regulation, empathy, and decision-making tools. Career readiness sessions will provide guidance on resume writing, job interviews, and identifying career paths, while mental health services will address emotional challenges. Transportation, training materials, and community engagement events will support program accessibility and amplify its impact, ensuring all intended outcomes are achieved.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The project will provide direct services such as emotional intelligence training, one-on-one and group mentorship, and career readiness workshops tailored to help at-risk youth develop critical life skills. Mental health counseling and crisis intervention will be accessible for participants and their families, while transportation services will ensure attendance and engagement in program activities. Additionally, the project will host community events to promote stakeholder involvement and awareness of available resources.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

This project serves at-risk youth aged 10-24, economically disadvantaged individuals, homeless youth, victims of trauma or abuse, and those currently or formerly incarcerated. By targeting vulnerable populations in need of support, the project aims to address critical social and economic challenges. The program is designed to impact over 400 individuals annually, fostering positive change across diverse communities.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The project is expected to improve the emotional intelligence (EI) of at-risk youth, fostering better decision-making, increased academic success, reduced substance abuse, and a decrease in juvenile delinquency. It will empower participants with life skills and provide mentorship to support long-term personal and professional growth. The outcomes will be measured using pre- and post-program evaluations, participant surveys, tracking attendance and completion rates, and monitoring long-term indicators such as academic performance, job placements, and recidivism reduction. Community feedback and stakeholder reports will further validate the program's effectiveness.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

In addition to standard penalties, the contracting agency could implement financial penalties such as withholding or reducing funds proportionate to unmet deliverables. Other measures could include requiring a corrective action plan with strict deadlines, temporary suspension of funding until compliance is achieved, and public reporting of underperformance. Persistent non-compliance may lead to contract termination to ensure accountability and proper use of appropriated funds.
