a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Adults living with mental illnesses will be trained in our teaching kitchen to learn culinary and life skills that can be applicable in any job setting. The skills taught are transferable and can be used in many other jobs in addition to the food industry if the person so desires. Our teaching kitchen emphasizes on the importance of excellent customer service.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Practical Training: our adults will have hands on experience working in a teaching kitchen environment.
 Internships/Apprenticeships: we have partnered with local restaurants to offer on the job training in the real world.
 Business Management training will cover topics such as inventory management, cost control, marketing and financial management.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Our target population are adults with serious and persistent mental illness. 200 adults unduplicated and 3,560 duplicated per year.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Experience is an important requirement for a qualified job. Providing hands on teaching, internships and apprenticeships with enhance job opportunities for individuals working in the field. The average yearly income of individuals working in the food industry is \$65,376. The income levels for individuals working in the food industry will provide incomes that will meet the needs of individuals and keep them out of poverty and lessen the need for reliance on external resources. Individuals will be tracked upon completion of our program.
