FDC has enduring challenges related to employee recruitment and retention. Of the FDC's ~24,000 employees, ~17,000 are correctional officers yet over 5,000 vacancies still exist statewide, with 23,375 positions overall. The vacancy rate of just over 25% is an improvement over November 2021's 38.5%. But gaps still exist despite recent reforms in what can often be a dangerous and undesirable place to work. Employees are leaving for higher paying jobs and FDC is limited in its ability to compete.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

FDC will offer coaching and advising services at no out of pocket costs to FDC Employees and their family members.

Through one-on-one sessions, coaches will help FDC Employees and their immediate family members define their education goals, make school and program/major selections, and navigate the admissions process. The offering extends to those who wish to pursue higher education. In addition, Career Coaches will help FDC Employees understand and learn how to maximize the education benefit available to them through the State of Florida's State Tuition Waiver.

For FDC Family members in college/university, Coaches stay in touch, to help with time management issues that frequently occur with working adults who are also attending an institution of higher learning, work/life/school balance, and support to help individuals reach their end goals.

FDC will offer coaching and advising services to FDC employees and their family members.
