### 13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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IMPACT is seeking funding to expand our Academy to serve the growing special-needs population in our region. Our Academy is at capacity, serving students ranging from K-22, and we are often forced to turn away families in need. With this funding, we plan to add two additional classrooms, construct a playground to offer additional therapeutic services, and construct an Activities for Daily Living (ADL) room to teach students important life skills.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

With this funding, we will be able to offer physical, occupational, speech, and applied behavior analysis therapy services to even more families, while increasing our Academy enrollment from 58 to 80 students. The needed expansion will also benefit our after-school programs and summer camps. The playground construction will provide for new alternative therapy programs to further engage our students while improving their mental & physical health. Additionally, the playground equipment will be designed so that students with physical limitations can engage alongside their peers. The ADL room will provide invaluable life skills so that students can be successful once they have graduated from our Academy.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

An increase in educational opportunities with the addition of more specialized classrooms and ancillary space that will provide enhanced learning environments and smaller classroom sizes for individualized attention. Our individualized physical, occupational, speech and applied behavior analysis therapy services will be expanded with this funding to provide the best possible outcomes for each family. Funding will also allow expansion to our after-school programs as well providing more summer camp opportunities for our growing community.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Developmentally and physically disabled youth from the ages of 6 weeks to 22 years of age. Persons with poor mental and physical health including preschool, grade, and high school students. IMPACT also serves young adults who are post high-school in our transition program up to 22 years of age. IMPACT projects to provide more than 50,000 total hours of therapies to 550+ families in 2025 alone. The demand for our services continues to increase each year.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

IMPACT will be able to serve a broader population of families improving their physical & mental health, provide career readiness for students after graduation, provide job opportunities as we hire more staff to work with the increased Academy population and assist with the diversion from criminal activities. The methodology to measure these benefits includes baseline standard periodic testing, school & therapeutic assessment tracking, workforce training assessment tool, career placement following graduation, tracking of independent living skills, and direct correlation of after-school programs reducing juvenile crime published by the Leon County Child Services Council.
