13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The Regional Entrepreneurship Centers (REC) and Statewide Small Business Loan Fund (SBLF) provide training, technical assistance, and capital access to low- to moderate-income businesses in Florida. Many small businesses struggle to access resources due to insufficient preparation. REC and SBLF target developing businesses earning under \$1 million annually, helping them become sustainable, job-creating contributors to Florida's economy.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Regional Entrepreneurship Centers (REC) will provide group and individualized business development training, counseling, and access to capital for entrepreneurs/small business owners to improve and strengthen their businesses. Urban League of Broward's CDFI, Central County CDC, will provide capital for eligible small businesses in each market served by REC to help them grow and scale.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Regional Entrepreneurship Centers (EC) provide marketing, social media, networking events, community outreach, workshops, and panel discussions for underserved businesses. Entrepreneurs receive intake assessments, cohort training, expert coaching, and connections to resources like SBA greater market access. The Statewide Small Business Loan Fund offers capital access through pre/post-loan counseling, direct lending, and underwriting for businesses deemed ready through REC programs.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The Regional Entrepreneurship Centers will serve small businesses, targeting low to moderate income small businesses that earn less than \$1 million in annual revenue. If fully funded, this program will serve over 1500 residents across the state, including the following counties: Broward, Palm Beach, Dade, Duval, Clay, Nassau, St. Johns, Baker, Flagler, Putnam, Volusia and Pinellas Counties and their surrounding areas.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Find the outcomes and measurements for the FEC and SBLF: Business Growth: Increase in new business registrations (documented by Sunbiz registrations). Job Creation & Expansion: Number of new jobs and wage levels reported by business owners. Capital Access: Funds secured through the Urban League's CDFI and state programs like SSBCI. Data Collection: Registrations and surveys recorded in a secure client management system. Reporting: ROI data compiled quarterly and annually in a cumulative report.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

In our experience meeting deliverables or performance measure is critical to our success and that of the state. Penalties for non performance may include reduction in funding or inability to be reimbursed for ineligible activities that have been completed and of course, cancellation of the contract if egregious activities should ever occur.
