4. Project/Program Description

The Girls Intervention Program PLUS (GIPP) is a 12-week program supporting at-promise girls aged 13 to 17 who are firsttime offenders, struggling academically or behaviorally, or at risk of trafficking. In Florida, 29% of girls experience depression, 23% suffer from anxiety, and 21% face social phobias, making them more susceptible to substance abuse and exploitation. Girls are referred to the program by the Justice Department, school principals, counselors, and parents. GIPP aims to prevent sexual victimization and criminal behavior by equipping vulnerable girls with protective factors essential for a healthy future.

13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



The GIPP program gives "at-promise" girls hope and provides them with the opportunities and resources necessary to engage in positive alternatives to the poor life choices they were making prior to the program. The goal of this program is to help these girls learn about and avoid some of the most immediate threats to their well-being. GIPP aims to transform the life vision of girls who have become involved or display indicators of becoming involved with the juvenile justice system, sex trafficking and other harmful behaviors.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

This appropriations request will enable Girl Power Rocks to expand the successful GIPP program by enhancing comprehensive wraparound services, particularly in mental health. The funds will allow the hiring of in-house therapists to provide the Family Wrap Around Services, starting with initial assessments and ongoing support through Targeted Case Manager and Licensed Mental Health Therapists. This support will help both girls and their parents overcome obstacles to program completion and build protective factors for long-term success.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The program provides a safe space where young girls can focus on positive challenges, make healthy decisions, and engage in constructive activities. Daily services include research-backed, structured learning sessions, substance abuse and violence prevention programs, sex trafficking awareness education, academic and vocational support, peer mentoring, life skills training, case management, assistance with community service hours, and, when necessary, mental health and substance abuse counseling.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Designed specifically for at-promise girls from underserved communities and their families, ages 13 to 17, who are firsttime offenders and facing behavioral and academic challenges. These girls are often at high risk of becoming involved in negative risk behaviors and are particularly vulnerable to being trafficked. Currently, Girl Power Rocks can serve up to 40 girls per year through this transformative program. However, with the funding from this appropriations request, we will be able to expand our capacity and reach more girls in need.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will

be measured?

GIPP aims to improve academic performance by boosting attendance, grades, and engagement while enhancing emotional well-being through self-esteem, resilience, and emotional regulation. The program also raises awareness to prevent trafficking and reduce vulnerability to exploitation. Progress is tracked using pre- and post-program assessments, including the Beck Depression Inventory and Child Behavior Checklist, along with behavioral surveys measuring high-risk activities like substance use and fighting.

for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

To maintain program integrity, GIPP enforces strict accountability measures. Payments are phased and contingent on meeting key performance indicators (KPIs). Funding may be reduced if goals or benchmarks, such as participant numbers and mental health screenings, are not met. Additionally, contractors failing to fulfill deliverables must repay disbursed funds, with regular audits ensuring proper use of resources.
