While these sources help sustain operations, they are not sufficient to fully cover housing costs and program expansion. State funding is critical to ensuring continued support for vulnerable families and preventing reentry into the foster care system.

13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The requested funds will provide stable transitional housing for vulnerable single mothers and their children, preventing family separation and reducing foster care reentry. By covering leasing costs, utilities, and property maintenance, the funds will ensure families have a safe, affordable place to live while working toward financial stability, healing from trauma, and achieving self-sufficiency.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The requested funds will be used to provide safe, stable housing for vulnerable single mothers and their children. Activities and services supported by these funds include leasing homes, covering utilities, and maintaining properties to ensure habitable living conditions. This housing stability enables families to focus on financial independence, trauma recovery, and personal growth while preventing reentry into the foster care system.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The appropriation project will directly provide transitional housing for vulnerable single mothers and their children, ensuring they have a stable and secure place to live. This includes covering rent, utilities, and property maintenance. Stable housing serves as the foundation for families to work toward financial stability, pursue education or employment, access community resources, and break cycles of trauma and foster care involvement.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population served by this project is vulnerable single mothers and their children who have experienced significant trauma, such as homelessness, foster care involvement, incarceration, or substance abuse recovery. These families are at risk of separation or have recently reunified and need stable housing to rebuild their lives. The project is expected to serve approximately 50 individuals annually, with the possibility of expanding to 100 over the next 1-2 years and beyond as the program gains momentum and our building project is realized.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected benefits of this project include improved mental health, enhanced economic self-sufficiency, reduced recidivism, reduced substance abuse, and prevention of child protective services involvement. These outcomes will be measured through:

Mental health improvements: Tracked by participation in therapy, self-reported mental health assessments, and case manager evaluations.

Economic self-sufficiency: Measured by employment rates, income levels, participation in financial coaching, and completion of educational programs.

Reduced recidivism: Evaluated through the percentage of participants who avoid re-incarceration or legal system involvement during and after the program.

Reduced substance abuse: Tracked through program drug testing (if applicable), self-reported sobriety, and continued participation in recovery programs.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?



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In addition to standard penalties, the contracting agency may consider implementing the following actions if performance measures are not met:

Financial withholdings or reductions: A percentage of the funding could be withheld if key deliverables, such as housing stability, participant retention, and financial independence, are not achieved.

Mandatory performance improvement plans (PIPs): If deliverables are not met, the agency may require the organization to submit a PIP, outlining corrective actions, timelines, and resource allocation.

Increased reporting requirements: More frequent or detailed reports may be requested to track progress toward meeting

objectives.

Potential contract termination: If continued non-compliance occurs despite corrective measures, the agency may consider terminating the contract.

These measures would be aimed at ensuring the program's effectiveness and accountability in meeting its objectives for vulnerable families.
