An emergency intake center manager oversees operations, while a care coordinator facilitates therapeutic and life-skills classes. The case manager handles medical, psychiatric, and program needs. Resident assistants provide care during nights and weekends, addressing emergencies and ensuring a trauma-informed environment.	270,000

13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?



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Requested funding will be used to establish an emergency intake center for exploited women in the Florida Panhandle. The priority is to provide a compassionate and therapeutic environment where survivors can experience a sense of safety. The intake center will close a gap in services between rescue and long-term residential placement for survivors.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Survivors of human trafficking require a specialized trauma informed care program. This plan is designed specifically for them and establishes a foundation to build trust, respect and privacy while building relationships. The center will provide an environment that fosters stability, peer support and the optimum conditions to begin the healing process.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Women in trafficking situations have little or no access to health care. Upon entry into the emergency intake center, each person will be screened for medical, dental and mental health issues that need immediate care. Improving physical and mental health will empower survivors to shift from survival mode to using their voice in decisions directly affecting their future. Traffickers control their victims through various means: drugs, starvation and physical abuse. Drug addiction requires expert intervention and will also be evaluate during the intake screening process.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population served by the center are women who are being exploited and trafficked in the counties that comprise the Florida Panhandle. There is not an emergency intake center in the seven counties that make up the Panhandle. The center will be the only one of its kind and will meet a critical need and impact multiple communities. We estimate 200-400 women per year will find freedom as well as a new beginning at the Emergency Intake Center.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The Emergency Intake Center will not only benefit the victims of human trafficking but will provide law enforcement with a critical resource. The judicial system will be impacted by fewer cases before the bench and recidivism can be reduced. The center will be a link in the collaborative network needed to eradicate exploitation in the communities where we work, live and play. The methodology will begin with data collection on all clients as they progress from survival mode to selfsufficiency. Data collection will be done at pre-determined times frames for evaluation and program effectiveness.
