The funds will be used to construct more than 100 affordable housing units across three sites in Jacksonville's Arlington and Westside neighborhoods. The project is a partnership with the City of Jacksonville, Jacksonville Housing Finance Authority and Florida-based developers to support Jacksonville's affordable housing needs. The latest Rental Market Study by the Shimberg Center for Housing Studies states a need for affordable housing units in Duval County. There are over 27,000 cost burdened renters between 50.01 and 80% AMI and more than 54,000 low-income tenants (<= 60% AMI) in Duval county, local governments and developers have a large number of affordable housing units to supply.
