4. Project/Program Description

Temple Beth-El is undergoing security improvements at the Temple as a response to increased antisemitic activity since the October 7, 2023 attack on Israel by Hamas. In response to a state-funded security assessment, state funding would support the purchase and installation of security-rated glass in classrooms (consistent with Pinellas County Schools standards) and Temple sanctuary, upgrades to doors connecting the sanctuary to Early Childhood Center classrooms, installation of interior security cameras and fabricated metal over vulnerable windows, a restricted access system, and security guards during classroom hours until the hardening is complete. The Temple serves 370 families, hosts weekly services with 200 attendees, a year-round Early Childhood Center (80 children), Sunday School (80 children) and Wednesday school (30 children). High Holy days attendance exceeds 500 attendees and the Temple hosts an annual festival that brings 10,000 local residents to the Temple.

13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Teachers, children and families who use the Early Childhood Center (which includes VPK students) will be able to learn in a safe and secure environment. The increased hardening measures will greatly reduce the need for security personnel for both internal events and external community events.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

State funding will increase security for 370 families,160 children and the greater St Petersburg community which makes significant use of the facility including an annual festival held at the Temple attended by 10,000 local residents. State funding will also enable Temple Beth-El to engage security personnel during school hours, services and widely attended events, and prepare staff, parents, congregants and visitors to respond effectively to antisemitic or violent attacks or hate crimes.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Enhanced security at Temple Beth-El St. Petersburg will protect the 370 families, 160 children at the Sunday and Wednesday Schools and the Early Childhood Center which meets Monday-Friday year-round, and the greater St. Petersburg community which makes significant use of the facility including an annual festival held at the Temple attended by 10,000 local residents, from external threats to their safety.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The 370 families who are members of Temple Beth-El St. Petersburg, 80 children who attend the Early Childhood Center and Sunday School and 30 students who attend Wednesday evening school and programming. The Temple also provides community for many of its elderly congregants. The greater St Petersburg community attends educational and social programming at Temple, and over 10,000 residents attend the annual art festival. More than 13,000 individuals will be served.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Ilncreased security for 370 families,160 children and the greater St Petersburg community which makes significant use of the facility including the Temple's annual art festival which is attended by 10,000 local residents. The increased hardening measures will greatly reduce the need for security personnel for both internal events and external community events achieved with completion of facility hardening measures.
