Over the last several years, especially after the Hamas terrorist atrocity of October 7, 2023, there has been a historic rise in acts of intolerance and biased-based hate crimes. The MMOT is a traveling education center that uses immersive technology and facilitated dialogue to deliver carefully designed workshops that cover topics including antisemitism and hate, the lessons of the Holocaust, the Civil Rights movement, and digital media literacy, all taught age-appropriately. MMOT workshops empower participants with knowledge of the dangers of intolerance.

Operations and coordination of two Mobile Museums of Tolerance as they travel across Florida, providing a dynamic educational experience challenging students, educators, and community members to ignite action against antisemitism, racism, prejudice, and hate to advance the creation of a more just and compassionate society.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The MMOT brings the field trip experience directly to schools, libraries, and other community venues with workshops on topics including the Holocaust, Rights, Antisemitism, Understanding and Combating Hate, and Digital Media Literacy.

In addition to serving elementary and high school students and colleges, the MMOT is an educational resource for teachers, faith groups, law enforcement agencies, government leaders, and the community at large.

The MMOT will inspire Floridians to stand up to hate and contribute to positive social change.
