### The Florida Senate Local Funding Initiative Request Fiscal Year 2025-2026

Florida Alliance of Boys & Girls Clubs - Workforce Readiness Program

Florida's Boys & Girls Clubs offer workforce readiness programs that provide school-age children and youth with valuable opportunities to explore and develop essential workplace skills. Through evidence-informed curricula, these programs focus

on key areas such as discovering students' interests and passions, building employability skills, and applying classroom knowledge to real-world experiences through internships and apprenticeships. Florida's Boys & Girls Clubs demonstrate strong financial support at the local level, with \$149.6 million raised through grants, donations, and fundraisers, significantly exceeding the \$11.1 million in state funds and highlighting the community's commitment to matching and surpassing public

support. This local, club-driven fundraising constitutes 93% of the Clubs' total investment in serving youth.

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

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The goal is to build tomorrow's leaders, innovators, and problem-solvers by providing workforce readiness programming for youth ages 6 to 18. These programs are designed to equip young people with essential life and career skills, preparing them for success in the workforce.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

Through hands-on experiences, mentorship, career exploration, and real-world learning, youth develop employability skills, leadership qualities, and a strong work ethic. By engaging in activities that promote critical thinking, teamwork, and adaptability, participants not only prepare for future jobs but also cultivate the confidence and skills needed to thrive in an ever-changing world.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The workforce readiness programming for youth ages 6 to 18 will provide a range of direct services designed to build essential career and life skills. For older youth, the program offers hands-on experience, job shadowing, and personalized development opportunities. For younger youth, the focus is on career exploration, mentorship, credentials, and soft skills training. These initiatives are aimed at equipping youth with the skills necessary for successful careers and meaningful employment.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The target population served by this workforce readiness project is more than 6,000 youth ages 6 to 18 who are attending the Boys & Girls Clubs in Florida. The program is designed to support both youth and the communities, with a focus on providing opportunities for skill development, career exploration, mentorship, and workforce readiness through a variety of age-appropriate services and experiences. Additionally, the surrounding communities are indirectly impacted through the engagement and development of their youth.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected outcomes of this project include improved employability skills, increased career awareness, and enhanced academic performance for youth. Participants will develop leadership abilities, gain real-world work experience through internships and job placements, and be better prepared for high school graduation and post-secondary education or employment. The outcomes will be measured using surveys, skills assessments, and tracking career progression, such as internships and job placements.
