13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

Overtown Promise and Empowerment Neighborhood (OPEN) ensures every child in Overtown has access to a Cradle-to-Career framework, guiding them from early learning to post-secondary success. Funding will support academic readiness, career pathways, and social services, removing barriers to graduation and workforce entry. With targeted programs, mentorship, and family engagement, OPEN empowers youth to break cycles of poverty and build a future of education, opportunity, and success.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

OPEN will provide early childhood learning, academic support, career training, mental health services, and family engagement programs. Activities include tutoring, internships, social-emotional learning, workforce readiness, and community resource access. These services ensure all participants receive holistic support, empowering youth and families toward long-term success

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

Funds provide direct services through the Cradle-to-Career model, benefiting families with children & youth (ages 0-25). Services include maternal health, early childhood learning, academic support, STEAM, case management, social-emotional learning, career & college readiness, and post-secondary support. These programs ensure holistic development, stability, and economic mobility for all families.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

The Target Population for the OPEN Initiative includes and we will provide services to 200 individuals and families: Persons with Poor Mental Health Economically Disadvantaged Persons At-Risk Youth and Individuals Preschool Students
Grade School Students (Elementary and Middle School) High School Students
University/College Students

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

Outcome: Increase high school graduation rates and track pathways to self-sufficiency among at-risk students in the Overtown community.

Tracking Method: We will monitor student progress through partnerships with Miami-Dade County Public Schools, tracking attendance, GPA, credit accumulation, and graduation rates. Additionally, we will track post-graduation pathways, including college enrollment, vocational training, and employment, using follow-up surveys and case management systems to measure self-sufficiency progress.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties for failing to meet deliverables or performance measures provided for in the contract?

If deliverables or performance measures are not met on time, the contracted entity must submit a Corrective Action Plan (CAP) within 30 days, detailing steps to address deficiencies and ensure compliance. Additionally, 10-20% of payments may be withheld until measurable progress is demonstrated. Repeated failure to meet key performance indicators may lead to reduced eligibility for future funding allocations.
