13. Program Performance

a. What specific purpose or goal will be achieved by the funds requested?

The funds requested will be used to operate a comprehensive residential treatment program designed to address substance use disorders and co-occurring mental health challenges among homeless and chronically homeless Veterans, as well as other indigent individuals in the community. The program aims to provide a safe and structured environment where clients can access evidence-based clinical treatment, counseling, case management, and life skills development. The ultimate goal is to help clients achieve long-term recovery, secure stable housing, gain employment or education opportunities, and reintegrate successfully into the community. For Veterans, the program also seeks to connect those without benefits to VA services, facilitate their transition to VA-funded programs, and provide tailored support for those not eligible for VA benefits.

b. What activities and services will be provided to meet the intended purpose of these funds?

The requested funds will support a therapeutic community providing comprehensive services to address substance use and promote recovery. Key activities include:

Clinical Services: Evidencé-based treatment and therapeutic interventions for substance use.

Counseling: Individual, group, and family sessions to build emotional stability, peer support, and family relationships.

Case Management: Coordinated care connecting clients to essential resources like housing and healthcare. Education and Employment: Support for returning to school, job readiness training, and workforce integration. Community Reintegration: Workshops and peer groups to ease the transition back into the community and foste

Community Reintegration: Workshops and peer groups to ease the transition back into the community and foster independence.

These services aim to equip individuals with tools for lasting recovery and community reintegration.

c. What direct services will be provided to citizens by the appropriation project?

The requested funds will support a residential Level IV treatment program providing comprehensive, client-centered care in a structured and supportive environment. Services include evidence-based clinical treatment for substance use, individual and group counseling, and family counseling to rebuild relationships. Clients will receive case management to access resources like healthcare, housing, and aftercare planning, as well as education and job readiness support to promote community reintegration. Life skills workshops and three nutritious meals a day will further support overall well-being and recovery. This holistic approach ensures clients are equipped for long-term success.

d. Who is the target population served by this project? How many individuals are expected to be served?

Veterans are the primary target population for this residential treatment program, with a strong focus on homeless and chronically homeless veterans in the community. The program prioritizes veterans without benefits, providing them with the necessary support to establish connections with the VA and facilitating their transfer to a VA-funded program once they are eligible. For veterans who are not eligible for VA benefits, the program offers tailored services to address their unique needs. In addition to veterans, the program also serves other indigent and homeless individuals in the community, particularly those facing substance use disorders, mental health challenges, and barriers to education, employment, and housing. The goal is to provide a comprehensive, supportive environment to help all participants achieve stability and long-term success in their recovery journey.

e. What is the expected benefit or outcome of this project? What is the methodology by which this outcome will be measured?

The expected benefit of this project is to help homeless and chronically homeless veterans, along with other indigent individuals, overcome substance use disorders, improve mental health, and reintegrate into the community. The program aims to reduce homelessness, enhance self-sufficiency, and increase access to healthcare, education, and employment opportunities. Outcomes will be measured by tracking the number of individuals who transition to stable housing, using case management and housing data. Substance use recovery will be assessed with standardized tools, while mental health improvements will be measured through the PHQ-9 and GAD-7. Employment and education outcomes will be monitored through case management records. For veterans, VA enrollment and transfers to VA-funded programs will be tracked. Client satisfaction and retention will be assessed through surveys, and follow-up assessments will be conducted at 3, 6, and 12 months to evaluate long-term impact.

f. What are the suggested penalties that the contracting agency may consider in addition to its standard penalties
